Marlene Stewart Wins Ladies Open Golf Title

LAVAL-SUR-LE-LAC, Que., Aug. 12 (CP) — Marlene Stewart, Canada's grim little golfing prodigy of the year, won the Canadian ladies open golf championship Saturday with a hair-raising one-up victory over Grace Lenzyck of Hartford, Conn.

Under terrific pressure and her three-hole lead all but wiped out by a thrilling last-stand comeback of the former champion, Marlene refused to crack. The Fonthill, Ont., girl calmly rapped down a 10-foot putt at the 35th to halve the hole and preserve a shaky one-up lead.

Then came the 422-yard par-five 36th, last chance for the one-time U.S. national women's champion to keep the match alive. Both girls were short with their second shots, just below a hill that leads up to the green. Marlene pitched 15 feet from the pin, Grace 10 feet.

Marlene potted less than a foot from the cup. The 23-year-old Connecticut girl carefully lined up her putt that turned out to be a heart-breaker. The ball stopped a scant inch short. Conceding the hole, Grace walked across the green and congratulated the new champion.

It was the second national championship in seven days for the youngster from the Lookout Point Club in Fonthill, near Niagara Falls. A week ago she marched off with the Canadian ladies closed championship.

Vatican Raps Criticism Of Italian Government

VATICAN CITY, Aug. 10—(AP) —The Vatican, through its publications, has rapped Roman Catholic criticism of Premier Alcide De Gasperi's government and impudently reaffirmed that lay organizations under its control will not function as purely political organs.

Such a function by Catholic organizations is, in fact, prohibited by the Lateran pact between the Vatican and Italy. This development, none the less, indicated growing concern in some Catholic circles with what is believed by them to be too slow progress by the government in social reforms.

This same belief within the Government's own Christian Democrat ranks was partly responsible for De Gasperi's latest crisis, resolved Thursday when he won a chamber of deputies vote of confidence for his new cabinet.

Luigi Gedda, vice president of Catholic Action and head of the Civic Committee, which helped de Gasperi in 1948, prompted the Vatican's admonishment when he criticized the government for opening the crisis and for lack of unity within its ranks.

The Gedda article was printed in Collegamento, official publication of the Civic Committee. It immediately aroused speculation in the Italian press, some of which professed to see in it a sign that the Civic Committee, disgruntled with the government, planned to enter the political arena as a party.
