Totem carving by the Tlingit Indians of Alaska had almost died out when the U.S. Forest Service revived the art in the 1930s.

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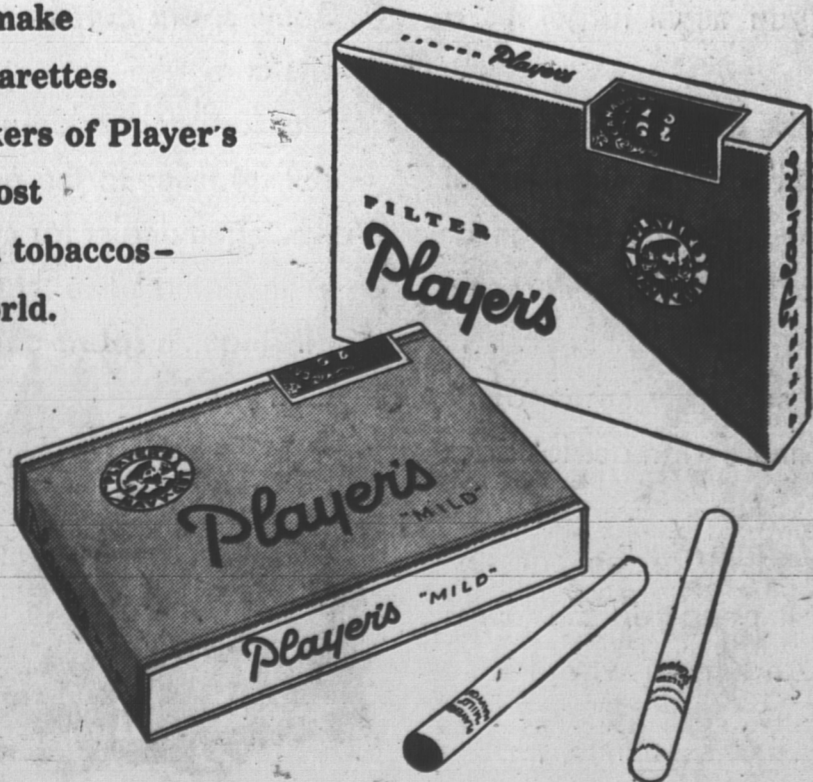
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
