Czech Being Scouted By New York Rangers

TORONTO (CP) — Vaclav Fedomansky, a hard-shooting centre from Czechoslovakia, would like to play in the National Hockey League.

But he will have to wait until after the 1968 Winter Olympics. "There is a chance that I might try the National Hockey League," said the 22-year-old star of the touring Czech team before a game Wednesday night against the Junior A Ontario Hockey Association All-Stars.

But nothing will be decided until after the 1968 Olympics. That is the big goal of our team right now. I would like the chance to play professional hockey."

But Dr. Dzenek Arndt, president of the Czechoslovakian Ice Hockey League, isn't sure he will get that chance. "None of our players will be released before the Olympic Games," he said. And even then, none that will be of use to us."

Nedomansky is a useful hockey player in Czechoslovakia. He is so useful, in fact, that the NHL New York Rangers heard about him, scouted him and put him on their negotiation list.

Coaches Express Usual Headaches

By THE CANADIAN PRESS College football teams march into a weekend of five big bowl games with hands blaring and crowds cheering, but the coaches are whistling the same old refrain—they're worried.

"They're going to be fighting mad," coach Bear Bryant of Alabama Orangemen said. Nebraska Cornhuskers, his team's opponents in the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans Monday.

Coach Bobby Dodd, meanwhile, is worried by an unusual rash of injuries that has struck his Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets as they prepare for the Orange Bowl game against Florida University at Miami Monday night.

Three other bowl games pit Georgia against Southern Methodist University in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas Saturday at 2:30 p.m. EST; Tennessee against Syracuse University in the Gator Bowl at Jacksonville beginning at 12 noon Saturday and Purdue University against University of Southern California in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, Calif., Monday at 5 p.m.

TO BE SEEN IN CANADA The Rose Bowl game will be televised nationally by the CBC. Nebraska is an average 35 to 40 pounds heavier than Alabama and lost 29-28 to a smaller Alabama team in the Orange Bowl last year.

Tennessee has won only six of 13 bowl games, including 1-2-3 year's 2-4 victory over Tulane in the Bluebonnet Bowl, while Syracuse has won only two of six bowl games for coach Ben Schwartzwalder. Tennessee is favored by six points.
