The Hudson's Bay Company Sunday released the name of a 23-year-old clerk who was one of eight persons killed Friday night when a single-engine Norseman aircraft crashed and burst in northwest Ontario.

The plane, owned by TransAir Limited of Winnipeg, crashed shortly after taking off from Big Trout Lake on a 60-mile flight to Kiasa Bonika, Ont. There were no survivors.

The other victims included the pilot, Maurice Dubois of Sioux Lookout, Ont., and six Indians, including a couple and their two children, and two girls. The names of the Indian passengers were not released.

An Ontario lands and forests department plane spotted the burning plane Friday night, apparently soon after the crash. A second party later reached the wreck and said there were no survivors.
