

# N.H.L. Season To Open At Record Early Date

 MONTREAL, Sept. 15 (AP)—The National Hockey League opens its 70-game 1952-53 schedule Thursday, Oct. 9—earliest date in the 36 years of league operation.  
 The opening clashes bring Chicago Black Hawks to Montreal to meet Canadiens while Detroit Red Wings, Stanley Cup champions, play host to New York Rangers.  
 The schedule, issued tonight by N. H. L. officials, opens two days earlier than it did at Detroit last year, but has the same number of games. It ends Sunday, March 22.  
 Toronto Maple Leafs make their first stand at home Oct. 11 with the Leafs meeting Chicago. This will be a test of the trading abilities of the high command of both teams. Harry Lumley, goalkeeper of the Hawks last year, will be in Toronto togethery while Frankie Al Rollins, last season's goal Janitor of Toronto, will be with the Leafs.  
 Boston fans see the 1952-53 edition of the Bruins for the first time Oct. 12, with Montreal Canadiens as opponents. These teams were play-off rivals last year.  
 New York Rangers, last team to play a home game, meet Boston Bruins Oct. 22.  
 The two Canadian clubs, Montreal and Toronto, play most of their home games Saturdays. The Leafs play 24 and Canadiens 22. The Leafs are home 11 Wednesday while Montreal plays 13 week-day games Thursdays.  
 Chicago, Boston and Detroit have most of their home games Sunday, the Black Hawks 17, Bruins 17, and Red Wings 15.  
 The Rangers will play four times in five nights on six different occasions. Toronto plays four games in five nights four times, while Montreal and Detroit see such action three times and Chicago and Boston twice.

## Eddie Arcaro Rides Winner

NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (AP)—Eddie Arcaro, who already has set an all-time mark for earnings in one season, turned in another one of his superlative stakes performances today when he guided Hix to a half-length victory over Teat-Maker in the six-furlong fall high-weight handicap at Belmont Park.  
 The opening day of the track's fall meeting was a sombre one. Sunday a fire in a track barn destroyed 25 thoroughbreds valued at \$125,000. Some had been scheduled to race today.  
 In riding Mrs. B. F. Whitaker's three-year-old gelding to victory, Arcaro chalked up his 34th stakes win of the year and boosted the amount of his purse winnings close to the \$2,000,000 mark. Hix brought his owner \$17,300. The veteran jockey now has won \$1,963,671 for various owners this year.  
 Hix returned \$9.30, \$5.80 and \$4.20. Teat-Maker, top-weighted 140 pounds, finished a half length in front of Papoose with First Glance fourth.  
 Hix, carrying 130 pounds, was timed in 1:08 2/5.

## Second Dodgers Player Receives Threatening Letter

NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (AP)—George Shuba, Brooklyn Dodgers outfielder, has become the second member of that team to receive a threatening letter within the last week, the Federal Bureau of Investigation announced tonight.  
 The letter was postmarked Sept. 15. It warned the Dodger outfielder not to set foot on Ebbets Field for the rest of the season. It was received by Shuba at the Brooklyn park.  
 Relief pitcher Joe Black was the recipient of a similar letter prior to the last Dodgers-Giants series last week.

## Unsinkable Clothing Latest U. K. Export

LONDON, Sept. 15 (Reuters)—Unsinkable—and highly secret—clothing is about to become Britain's newest dollar earner.  
 British manufacturers of a type of clothing which is secretly produced to keep its wearers afloat, today announced a £100,000 deal with a U. S. firm to produce unsinkable vests, bathing suits, belts and underwear and other garments in the United States.  
 Made of a buoyant substance sandwiched between water-repellent material, the product's unsinkability has been tested in a pair of men's trunks capable of keeping a 200-pound man afloat.  
 Underclothing capable of keeping a fisherman in all his winter gear, including waders, afloat in rough seas for 45 minutes.  
 Medical bathing suits for infantile paralysis patients undergoing water treatment.  
 Several shapely models, whose shapeliness was not destroyed by the unsinkable swim-suits they were wearing, recently demonstrated the suits' buoyancy by jumping into the Thames, bound hand and foot.

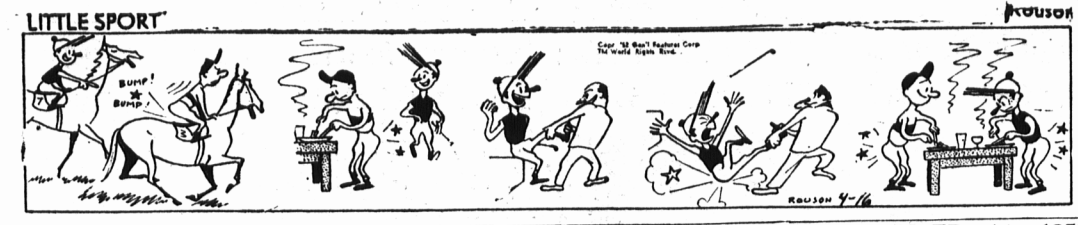

## Jersey Joe Shows Speed In Workouts

 ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 15 (AP)—If old age is creeping up on Jersey Joe Walcott, you can't tell it by the workouts of the ancient ring warrior.  
 The 38-year-old heavyweight champion moves through his boxing drills with a bounce in every limb and a spring in his step as he prepares for his Sept. 23 title bout with Rocky Marciano in Philadelphia.  
 He looks faster and in far better condition now than he did in preparing for his June 5 title defence against Ezzard Charles.  
 "He should," said manager Felix Boccicchio. "He's always in good shape and he's never really broken in training since he started working for Charles."  
 "And he's more confident now," added the manager. "Charles is the toughest heavyweight around. Marciano is a crude guy who can hit but he's no Charles."  
 Asked how he measured Charles and Marciano as opponents, Walcott said "you really can't compare them."  
 "Charles is a fighter who can do everything. He can hook or jab with his left, hit hard with his right, can hit moving back or forward, can hit you out—he can do everything. This Marciano is a tough fighter, rough, crude and he can walk."  
 Joe has been using his old walking shuffle on his battered sparring mates. He steps away to the side and then pivots, losing a left hook or a heavy right in a flashing movement.  
 He looked so good in a Sunday workout that a reporter wondered out loud how long Joe intended to keep fighting.  
 "So long as the Good Lord blesses me with health and strength; I may go on until I'm 50," said Walcott.

## Dodgers And Giants Win Games To Leave N.L. Pennant Race Unchanged

 Brooklyn Dodgers and their persistent pursuers, New York Giants, went on slugging binges in neighboring boroughs Monday but when the cannonading had ceased there was no change in the National League pennant fight. The Dodgers still led by three games.  
 The Dodgers blasted out five home runs, with Jackie Robinson and Duke Snider contributing a pair apiece, to smother Cincinnati Reds at Ebbets Field 11-5.  
 The Giants, bidding for a second miracle finish in as many years, cut loose on St. Louis Cardinals, winning 12-1 at the Polo Grounds after a nine-run outburst in the sixth inning.

The day's only other action was in the American League and had no bearing on the championship race. The leading New York Yankees and the challenging Cleveland Indians were tied.  
 Chicago White Sox rocked Boston Red Sox 4-2 on Rocky Krschick's bases-loaded single, his second such blow in two days. The lowly Detroit Tigers nipped Washington Senators 5-4.

## Order Probe Of Fire At Swank Belmont Park

NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (AP)—An investigation was ordered today after 25 thoroughbreds and a stable pony perished in a 15-minute fire at the swank Belmont Park racetrack.  
 George Clough, Nassau County fire marshal, directed an investigation into what he termed "flagrant abuses of ordinary fire prevention."  
 The horses lost were valued at \$125,000.  
 The blaze broke out late yesterday in the huge, wooden barn where about 50 horses come in every scheduled to run in today's opening fall card, were quartered.  
 Twenty-five were led to safety but there was no time to save the others, including such well-known stakes runners as Big II, owned by John T. Maloney of Virginia and Tool, owned by J. S. Kroese of Hackensack. N. J. E. P. Taylor of Toronto lost Noble Gesture.  
 Two well-known horses were among those saved. They were Primate, a Kentucky Derby hopeful of the past season, from G. B. Benjamin's Starmount Stable, and Navy Page, a Taylor-owned stake winner who fan with the top two-year-olds at the recent Sagamore meeting.  
 Dense clouds of smoke overcame 40 firemen, who battled the fire in a drizzling rain. Michael Novach, a groom, was taken to the hospital with burns suffered while rescuing owners who suffered the heaviest losses in the fire were Benjamin, Kroese, Maloney and Mrs. Charles E. Mither II.  
 Benjamin lost three two-year-olds, including Greensboro, Euthera and Alamanca. Mrs. Mather lost five horses, Maloney and Kroese four each in the blaze.  
 The fire occurred only a few yards from the ruins of another barn in which a young groom and 21 valuable thoroughbreds died in a blaze last spring.

## Students Begin Arriving For New College

ST. JOHN'S, Que., Sept. 15 (CP)—Students from across Canada began arriving here today to register for the opening Monday next of the College Militaire Royal de St. Jean, the new Canadian services college.  
 The college, designed primarily to prepare French-speaking officer candidates for commissions in the three services, will handle 125 students this year and will later build up into three times that number in a three-year course.  
 Canada's other service colleges are the Royal Military College at Kingston, Ont., and Royal Roads at Esquimalt, B. C.  
 This week is mainly set aside for registration—80 students arrived today—but the students, once grouped and settled into their respective classes, get down to serious business Monday night.  
 The students, whose age range from 16 to 20, will take the course in their mother tongue but it is estimated that 80 per cent of the students are French-speaking.  
 The course is mainly a science one, designed to train technical officers and leading to a degree in engineering. The professors, mostly lay, are drawn from colleges and universities in the province of Quebec, mainly from Laval University at Quebec and the University of Montreal.  
 When the students complete the course, they either will be line officers or may continue training for a technical engineering degree.  
 Once the course gets started, the students will find that they're not in for a picnic.

## International Rookie of Year Is Selected

NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (AP)—Ray Jablonski, slugging infielder-outfielder of Rochester Red Wings, has been voted the International League's rookie of the year by members of the circuit's Baseball Writers Association.  
 Jablonski, a St. Louis Cardinal farm hand, placed first on 14 of 33 ballots cast to nose out Don Hoak, Montreal third baseman.  
 Other players drawing votes were Chris Kitzos, Springfield, Joe Ebratt and Milt Jordan, Buffalo, two votes each and Ed Roebuck, Montreal, and Bubba Phillips, Buffalo, one each.  
 Jablonski, a righthander hitter, batted .300 for the season. He drove home 101 runs, collected 177 hits and 279 total bases, his hits included 18 home runs, 11 triples and 26 doubles.  
 Bobby Thomson and Whitey Lockman hit home runs for the Giants but neither came in the wild sixth inning in which the New Yorkers put together six hits, three walks and an error for their biggest single inning of the season.  
 Shortstop Al Dark banged out a pair of doubles to spark the big inning.  
 With this boisterous support, Sal Maglie coasted to his 17th victory against seven defeats. The Cardinals' loser was Al Brazie, first in a parade of four pitchers.  
 Bonus shortstop Harvey Kuenn tripled and scored the Tigers' winning run against Washington in the ninth on Fred Hatfield's fly ball. Hal Newhouse, working in relief, gained credit for the victory, the 199th of his big league career.

# Enos Slaughter Aiming At 2,000 - Hit Circle

 NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (AP)—Enos Slaughter, the ever-hustling country "hoy" of 36, is aiming at that 2,000-hit circle. Stan Musial, a team-mate on St. Louis Cardinals, made the grade last week and now Slaughter is thumping down the last 100 hits.  
 Last spring they said "Slaughter is all through." Although he was in fine condition, they shook their heads wisely and said "wait until August. He won't play '75 games."  
 Well, here it is Sept. 15 and Slaughter played his 131st game today against New York Giants. And playing at a 300 clip, seventh in the league. His major league career showed 1,911 hits through Sunday.  
 "I still play this game the only way I know how," he said before the game. "You only get out of it what you put in."  
 "Years ago in the minors Eddie Dyer (ex-Card manager) watched me run in from the outfield and then stop when I got to the base line. He asked me why I stopped. Ever since that day I've run every step of the way when I'm on the ball field."  
 "Sure the old legs and muscles ache a little now and then. I have to give them as much rest as I can. There's plenty of life in the old boy yet. I'm good for a few years yet."  
 It's hard to believe Slaughter has been around the majors since 1938. That was the year Musial was breaking in as a left-handed pitcher in the Mountain States League. Managers have come and gone while Enos stays on. First it was Frankie Frisch, then Ray Blades, Billy Southworth, Eddie Dyer, Marty Marion and Eddie Stanky. Slaughter gives out for every one.  
 Here's what Bill Meyer, the harassed Pittsburgh skipper, says. "That Slaughter kills us. You walk Musial and Slaughter hits a home run."
