## Education: Guidance Personnel Seen Need

A resolution that the department of education be requested to provide trained vocational guidance personnel for each supervisory district was passed by the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Federation of Home and School Associations at Montserrat House yesterday. The resolution was submitted by the provincial executive in view of the increase of vocational schools and high schools in the province, and the students' need for professional guidance.

Resolutions affirming that the appointment of a qualified librarian as provincial director of library services be hastened, and urging promotion of decent literature and alerting to dangers of obscenity were also passed by the meeting.

A resolution submitted by the P.E.I. local regarding the first aid training of ambulance drivers was referred to the provincial executive and resolution from the Hunter River group that the federation intercede with the government for encouragement and assistance in the writing of local histories was not considered due to the absence of sponsoring delegate.

A resolution was passed recording satisfaction with government response to the home and school brief and expressing the hope that immediate consideration would be given to the development of an adult education program as indicated in the brief.

M.F. Hagan, speaking for the community life committee, reported that the committee had been established to research into the obesity problem.

Miss Mildred Fraser of the library committee reported that she had been elected as chairman and was in the top layer as far as interest and work for libraries was concerned.

Rev. William Simpson, in summation, urged the delegates to "take advantage of the present and plan for the future".

Among his suggestions was the need for local executive meetings as well as membership meetings, and the need to come to grips with finances through membership fees, to make the organization self-sufficient.

Minutes of the last regular meeting were read and reports of various committees were given.

LETTERS READ  
A letter was read from W.C. Auld, manager, Island Telephone Company, regarding the board's recent reports.

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## Into the Water . . . Propellers at Rear

### 'Amphicar' Is Demonstrated On Water And Land In S'side

SUMMERSIDE — Something new in transportation made its debut at Summerside yesterday when an "amphicar", a land or water vehicle with the streamlined appearance of a new automobile, was demonstrated.

Equipped for travel on land or water, the amphicar is based on a trim looking sports car in a luxury cruiser by running it into the water and switching over the propulsion to the propellers, simply by moving a lever.

The car is completely water-tight and has a top speed of 10 mph in water, and up to 80 on land.

Driver Frank Anderson, of Saint John, N.B., hopes to try a cruise of Northumberland Strait with the car, which he said can go to any place a 14-foot boat could travel.

He said, however, the crossing of the strait would be attempted only on a fine day.

The boat cruises along the top of the water and almost floats when at full speed. Control is on water for a landing on shore it hits the shore or wharf from the three take over and meet the vehicle ashore.

Traveling on land the only obstacle is a road.
