Five vagrants were sentenced to fourteen days imprisonment; and the Magistrate announced his intention of imprisoning every corner loafer found out after 11 o'clock at night. Ben. Byers (colored) arrested for being out after hours, was fined \$4 or twenty days. We regret to learn that Mr. W. Cantwell, fireman on the Souris train, met with a frightful accident this morning. As the train was leaving Souris, he was in the act of stepping from the rail of a flat car to the tender. The rail gave way, and he fell headlong between the tender and the car. His shoulder struck the corner of the tender violently, and was dislocated, and the wheels of the first truck of the flat car passed over his left leg and broke it above the knee, and at the ankle. Mr. Cantwell was carried to his home and Dr. Mattart was summoned to attend. Dr. Conroy went to Souris this evening, and on his arrival a consultation will be held. RUSSIA AND ENGLAND.

PACIFIC NEWS.

The Admiralty Stops Chartering Small Vessels.

MOSCOW, May 4. The Gazette says it has reason to believe an honorable expedient has been found by which both sides can settle the Russo-English dispute.

CHICAGO, May 4. The Deutsche Zeitung says Russian diplomacy is not as yet anywhere near the end of its artifices and tricks. Russia may again and again put a difficulty in the way of settlement, and perhaps at last openly declare she will make no concessions in the boundary question.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 4. Though no definite reproachment between England and Russia has been received, the war cloud seems suddenly to have dissolved. The news that England has not annexed Port Hamilton in the Japan sea gives a feeling of relief.

LONDON, May 4. Despatches from Tientsin state that the dispute between China and Russia, regarding the frontier of Manchuria, has become acute, owing to the non-arrival of the Russian members of the delimitation commission, and the constant postponement of the date of the arrival at the place of meeting to settle the boundary.

LONDON, May 4. The Admiralty has issued an order stopping the further charter of ships of small capacity that were intended to be used for the transportation of troops. This order is regarded as foreshadowing the stopping of all war preparations.

TREPULEY, May 4. The dam at Karabund 70 miles north of Saraphis, has burst flooding the country for miles around. The Russians are making strenuous exertions to repair the damage done.

LONDON, May 5. Peace overtures continue, and the war cloud is rapidly disappearing. Russia has consented to retire from Penjdeh upon the meeting of the commission to arbitrate.

A SETTLEMENT PILLAGED!

The Saskatchewan Rising.

ALL QUIET AT THE FRONT.

WINNIPEG, May 4. Several Half-breeds, refugees, men, women, and children, from the north have arrived at Calgary. Beaver Lake settlement has been pillaged by S-onies. At Saddle Lake the government stores have been stolen by the rebels. A telegram from Medicine Hat announces the Saskatchewan River rising. Archbishop Tache has received a telegram confirming the reports of the killing of Rev. Father Fournment at Batoche. He was killed by Indians for refusing to grant them absolution for rebelling against the government. HUMBOLDT, N. W. T., May 4. The line has been down for two days. A courier just arrived from Gen. Middleton's camp reports all quiet up there. The men are anxious to move. The General is waiting for the galling gun on board the grounded steamer. No engagement will likely take place for some days.

Egyptian News.

SUAKIM, May 1. El Mahdi's men are becoming more daring every day. Last night they surrounded Tawhouk and Otao, and kept up a heavy fire on both places all night. The firing was however, of too long range to be effective. Another forward movement by the British troops, is expected to take place to-morrow.

DONGOLA, May 4.

El Mahdi has dismissed from his service the Emir of Berber.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, May 4. The House of Commons was again occupied in discussing the Franchise Bill. The Government has modified the bill by limiting the Indian vote to the older Provinces. Hon. Peter Mitchell and Hon. L. H. Davies spoke against the granting of voting power to the Indians. Hon. Mr. Davies said it was an insult to the intelligence of the white man who knew these Indians have no education, and have not the slightest conception of Government. Hon. Peter Mitchell endorsed Mr. Davies' statement regarding the Indians, and said the Premier was quite wrong in stating they were intelligent and progressive. They were, to his knowledge, a miserable, humiliated and debased race.

Exposition of Inventions.

LONDON, May 4. The Prince of Wales opened to-day the World's Exposition of inventions. The Princess of Wales, Duke of Edinburgh, Duke of Cambridge, Earl of Granville and Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt were among the distinguished persons present. The attendance of the general public was very large.

THE RUSSIAN WAR.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

AN ENGLISH SEIZURE.

While discussing the strained relations existing between England and Russia, the last action of England should not be overlooked. By the seizure of Port Hamilton England has secured the control of the Korean Strait, and possessed a Gibraltar which guards the southern entrance to the Japan Sea. The Nan-How group of islands consists of the two large islands Sodo and Sunhodo, with a smaller island called Observatory Island. The larger islands are deeply indented, their northern ends almost meeting, while Observatory Island is situated between their southeastern points, forming the spacious and well sheltered harbor known as Port Hamilton, the main entrance to which is in the southeastern part of the group. The entrance will admit vessels of the greatest draught, while the northern entrance, 250 yards wide, may be used by small vessels in fine weather. The holding ground is excellent, and there is room in the harbor for a large fleet. Port Hamilton is so well protected that it affords shelter in the worst weather. Sodo, the larger of these islands, is 650 feet high, and Sunhodo is 783 feet. They both present rugged, bold sides on either side of the entrance, and is fortified, in connection with Observatory Island could be defended against any force. There are several Korean villages on these islands containing about 2,000 people. Every available spot is cultivated, the principal crop being millet. Port Hamilton is over thirty miles north of the large island of Foulypa. By occupying these islands England has removed her base of supplies, in the event of war, over one thousand miles nearer to Vladivostok, the principal Russian port in Siberia, as Port Hamilton is only 140 miles from Nagasaki, where the inexhaustible coal mines are being worked, she can, within two weeks, in the depot of coal which will last her fleet for months. Sufficient supplies can also be gathered in a short time from Hong Kong and the Chinese and Japanese ports to make her quite independent of neutrals after war is declared. Port Hamilton is only 600 miles from Vladivostok. The English fleet will only guard the Korean Strait, but can gather at Port Hamilton for any descent upon the Russian possessions in Siberia. With the Korean Strait thus guarded, and one or two iron-clads in the Straits of Le Perouse and Tsugar, the Russian fleet will be practically confined to the Sea of Japan, and no vessel can escape to prey upon English commerce.
