

Tignish Pleas With New Paving

TIGNISH — The Tignish Village Commissioners are highly pleased with the recent paving of several streets in the village by the provincial government. At their meeting Tuesday the commissioners decided to send a letter of appreciation to Hon. Andrew MacRae, who was acting premier at the time the paving was ordered.

The commissioners said the paving has made a tremendous improvement in the streets of the village.

The meeting was informed that a Dr. R. Kennedy will commence a new medical practice in the village shortly. The community has been without a resident physician for several months.

It was also reported to the meeting that three new water

tanks for fire-fighting purposes are being installed on Bling Road Upper Church Street, on the property of Joseph Bato. The commissioners decided to have the storm sewers cleaned before the cold weather arrives. A letter of appreciation will also be sent to Roy F. Smith, contractor, for the sewerage project which has been completed.

The commissioners will attend the sessions of the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Village Commissioners Association which will be held in Victoria, Nov. 14.

A special meeting is slated for an evening to decide on the tax rate so that bills can be sent out promptly for payment before the annual meeting in January.

West Pt. Ferry Committee To Seek Second Cost Survey

The West Point Ferry committee will ask a Toronto consulting firm for a cost estimate on a traffic survey for the proposed new ferry service linking New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Peter MacCaull, committee chairman, said yesterday the committee feels the estimate already received from a local firm is considered to be too high.

The survey, which would determine the number of trucks

and automobiles likely to use the service, is a preliminary step towards establishing the ferry company.

It is expected the survey will be carried out over the winter months.

Mr. MacCaull also said he and the committee secretary, Robert Grisdley, M.A., will be meeting shortly with members of the Resources Development Council at Ellerslie to discuss the various aspects of the proposed service.

Island's Population Figures Remain Unchanged To Oct. 1

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's estimated population rose to 28,858,000 at Oct. 6 of this year with all provinces except Prince Edward Island reporting increases.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics said yesterday that the Oct. 1 figure represents an increase of 326,000 compared with the corresponding date in 1961.

The population estimate at Oct. 1 also was 445,000 more than the figure for the June 1, 1961, census.

The largest quarterly increase in the year between Oct. 1, 1961, and Oct. 1, 1962, was 92,000 in the June 1-July 1 period of this year.

The other quarterly increases were 88,000 between July 1 and Oct. 1, 1961; 77,000 between Oct. 1, 1961, and January 1, 1962; 74,000 between Jan. 1 and April 1, 1962; and 82,000 between July 1 and Oct. 1, 1962.

The starting point of quarterly population estimates is the final population count by province from the 1961 census.

Births and immigrations are added to provincial totals, while deaths and estimated emigrations are subtracted.

However, the table published by the bureau of statistics gives no breakdown of the figures which are used to produce provincial totals. It is not possible to determine from the table the degree to which the natural increase in population plus immigration is affected by deaths or emigration, mainly to the United States.

Among the provinces, Ontario had the largest numerical increase in population over Oct. 1, 1961, at 106,000. Quebec was second with an increase of 102,000 and Alberta third with 38,000.

While Alberta was third in numerical increase in the year, it was first in rate of growth at 2.8 per cent.

British Columbia's population rose 31,000, Manitoba 19,000, Newfoundland 12,000, Ontario 111,000, New Brunswick 7,000, Saskatchewan 3,000 and Prince Edward Island's population remained unchanged.

20 Potato Insurance Claims Filled

About 20 claims for potato crop insurance are being processed for payment by the provincial government's crop insurance agency, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said yesterday.

The claims amount to approximately \$11,000, he said.

Crop insurance on potatoes went into effect this year in the province and 54 growers took advantage of the system under which the federal and provincial governments share the cost.

Mr. MacRae said that the claims were for damage to potatoes from blight and excessive rainfall. Some of the claims have been paid yet, but, according to Mr. MacRae, they will be paid up by the end of the month.

Commenting on the insurance plan, the minister said "the \$11,000 worth of claims submitted show the advantage of such insurance, particularly when you run into a wet year, along with potato disease problems."
