Lobster Fishing Cases In Court

Fred C. Gallant, fisherman of North Rustico appeared before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in Queen's County Magistrate's Court, charged with having undersized lobsters. Three others, Lawrence Gallant and Bertram Blaquiere of North Rustico and Howard Gallant, Rusticville, were similarly charged and their cases were adjourned to Wednesday 20th.

Mr. J. P. Nicholson represented the Federal Department of Fisheries and Mr. R. R. Bell, Q.C. appeared for the accused.

Thomas A. Gauthier, captain of a fishery patrol boat testified that on May 5th he was checking the size of lobsters brought to the landing places by North Rustico fishermen and that he found 71 pounds, or 210 small lobsters in the catch of Fred C. Gallant for that day.

Witness said Mr. Gallant's total catch for that day amounted to 180 between eight and nine hundred lobsters.

Cross-examined by Mr. Bell, the witness said he had checked the lobsters which had been brought in that day by approximately 35 boats and had found small lobsters in about half the boats.

He said the North Rustico fishermen were law abiding and had often assisted him in seeing the fishery regulations were obeyed.

Asked if he considered a lobster one-third-second of an inch below the new two and a half inch measure, something upon which to convict a fisherman, the witness said his orders were to report all undersized lobsters. He had nothing to do with the prosecutions. Producing a metal measure, two and a half inches between the "jaws", witness said the measure had been given to him by Mr. Warren Farrar of the Department of Fisheries. He had been given the measure on May 1st but had not used it until May 4th. The fishermen had their own measures. Most of them were of plastic and had been secured by the fishermen on their own initiative.

Shown the metal measure produced in court by Mr. Gauthier, witness said he had brought it out to Mr. Gauthier on May 1st. The instrument originally came from Halifax. It had not been made for measuring lobsters long and had been in use last year when measuring lobsters of that length. This instrument, along with 13 others had been taken by the witness this spring to the machine shop at the Marine Wharf, Charlottetown, and had been widened to two and a half inches in order to conform to the new regulations which make lobsters less than two and a half inches, illegal to catch.

Cross-examined by Mr. Bell, witness said he had received orders from the Federal Fisheries Department to have these metal measures changed to conform to the new regulations, stating further that it was not necessary to have the metal measures approved by his Department after they had been changed.

Questioned further witness said, "I got orders to have the change made, and this was done." Mr. Bell continued, "I am asking you if the Department has officially approved the metal measures which you and your men are now using." Witness—"No. The Department has not approved it. It merely told us what to do." Questioned as to the quantity of undersized lobsters now coming in, witness said there had been an improvement.
