HELMSTEDT, Germany (AP)—Soviet authorities Wednesday night turned loose a U.S. Army truck convoy they had held in East Germany for 53 hours. The four-truck convoy and its five soldiers rolled into West Germany, past the check point on the border between East and West Germany, at 6:12 p.m. The U.S. state department earlier had delivered a stiff protest in Moscow against any interference with the Western Allies' access to Berlin.
