Canadian Consumer News

I want to tell you this week of some of the things C. A. C. is doing to try and make sure that consumers will get good value for their money when they buy clothing or textiles.

This work is directed by our Textile Standards Committee under the chairmanship of Miss Jessie Roberts of the household science department, University of Toronto. Here are the four sections of the work of this Committee:

- (1) The establishment of standards for every day merchandise. (2) The standardization of sizes for children's and women's clothes. (3) The labelling of the fibre content of materials. (4) The forwarding of legitimate complaints of consumers to manufacturers and retailers.

In 1949 C. A. C. was largely responsible for getting the Government to pass the "National Trade Mark and True Labelling Act."

Under this Act, the Government has power to set up standards for any product. C. A. C. is now asking the Government to set up standards for such things as sheets, work clothes, children's play clothes, etc. If it does this, and product meeting these standards will carry "CS" (Canada Standard) label.

FLUORIDATION OF DOMESTIC WATER SUPPLIES TO PREVENT DECAY OF TEETH

The great majority of inhabitants of a certain county in Texas had mottled teeth. Upon investigation, it was found that there was too much fluoride in their drinking water.

After the American Dental Association was satisfied as to the percentage of fluorides needed to prevent decay, the American Medical Association came to the same conclusion.

In a news release from the American Dental Association, we read, "The report of the American Medical Association that fluoridation of community water supplies is a safe procedure was hailed editorially by the American Dental Association, who have been advocating for several years that the fluoridation of domestic water supplies is the most effective public health measure yet devised to cut the incidence of number of cases of tooth decay. In test cities, fluoridation has been found to reduce tooth decay among school children by as much as 50 to 60 per cent, therefore both the American Dental Association and the American Medical Association state that no community need harbor misgivings about installing an approved water fluoridation process."

"Dental investigators long since have confirmed that fluoridation of water, using a definite percentage of fluorides, is harmless. Opponents of the process will not have to conceive new reasons for preventing installation of this simple and inexpensive health measure."

To finally clinch the matter, the U. S. Public Health Service, the governing council of the American Public Health Association and the State and Territorial Health Directors have endorsed fluoridation. Already a total of 140 communities.

How Can I...?

Q. How can I clean discolored aluminum ware? A. The discolored aluminum ware can be restored to its former shiny cleanliness by rubbing it with a cloth dipped in lemon juice and rinsing in warm water.
