

Magistrate Dismisses Truck Taking Charge

Austin Ernest Smith, Summerdale, charged with unlawfully taking a motor vehicle from its parking place with the intention of driving it, had his case dismissed by Magistrate J.B. Johnson, Q.C. in Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday.

Five witnesses were heard in the case. Crown prosecutor was Alan K. Seales. Lorne MacFarlane, Summerdale, the owner of the vehicle in question, a half-ton truck, told the court that both Smith and Ed Elmer Mack Gallant, Summerdale, were employed on his farm at New Glasgow.

He testified that, on September 8, he had noticed that the truck was missing and that the following day he had seen it on the Fountain Road, about 10-15 miles from the farm, with the front smashed. Damages had been estimated at about \$340, he said.

STRUCK HORSE A New Glasgow man, Oliver Henry Parkman, testified that he had been called to pick up Smith and Gallant near New London the day that the accident had taken place. He said they had told him they had struck a horse, that they didn't think they had hurt the horse, but that the truck had been damaged.

"Gallant was driving," said William Roy MacKenzie, Stanley Bridge, who testified that he received a lift from the two men in the truck on the evening of Sept. 5. He said that they had mentioned they were taking a run into Summerdale.

Elmer Mack Gallant, who had pleaded guilty to a similar charge yesterday, told the court he had driven the truck to Summerdale on returning they had struck the horse.

Constance Harry W. Burns, Charlottetown RCMP, said that he had seen the truck on September 13, had arrested the accused.

In dismissing the charge, the Magistrate said it seems quite possible that the accused believed Gallant was authorized to drive him to Summerdale.

Gallant, convicted as charged, was given a one-year suspended sentence, on paying \$500 bond, with one surety of \$500. Mr. MacFarlane acted as bondman.
