Second Big Ore Co. For Sept-Isles

QUEBEC (CP)—Premier Duplessis said Friday that the Quebec Cartier Mining Company will begin work soon on a \$100,000,000 iron-ore development.
The development is to be carried out on an immense bed of low grade iron ore deposits a few miles west of Sept-Isles, in north-eastern Quebec.
The project is the second large development of its kind in the area. The other was undertaken by the Iron Ore Company of Canada at Schefferville, 365 miles north of Sept-Isles. The company now is entering its third year of production.
Mr. Duplessis said the first mining operations by Cartier will be carried out at Mount Reid and later they will extend to Mount Washington, further north.
The first job, Mr. Duplessis said, will be the construction of a road into the area. This will be built at company expense and specifically call for a width of 50 feet. Later the company will build a railroad through to Mount Reid. A new company will be formed to build and operate the railway.
A town site will be built at Shelter Bay and at Mount Reid to house miners, office workers and technicians.

BOSTON (AP) — Having "nervous indigestion" or sufficient willpower so you'll moderately restrict your diet—plus having long-lived in your family tree—might help you live to be 106. Dr. Paul Dudley White indicated Thursday.
White, internationally known heart specialist, implied as much in introducing to doctors a 106-year-old "healthy" friend of his—as a demonstration "of the possibility of long life."
Among other examples of the durability of his scientific exhibit—Charles Thayer, of Belmont, Mass.—White related that "just last Monday, he got his coat caught in the door of a taxicab and was dragged on the road a few yards, and the only injury he got was a slight bruise on the hand." Also, he walks a mile a day.
Slightly built, bearded, and seemingly alert mentally, Thayer took it all in as he sat in the well of a lecture amphitheatre at

Predicts U. S. Steel Exports Will Increase

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel magazine predicts today that with domestic consumption of steel dropping, exports of semi-finished steel will rise this year.
Japan will be the chief customer for the increased exports, the metalworking trade weekly says.
A predicted downturn in steelworking operations is developing at a slower pace than expected. Operations have declined for seven consecutive weeks, but they still are above 90 per cent of capacity. Steel mill operations last week were at 90.5 per cent of capacity, down two points from the previous week.
The 1947 output will be close to the 120,000,000 tons originally estimated, the magazine predicts.
Steelworks operations will continue good through the second quarter. An export-led second-quarter dip will be offset partially by an upsurge in demand in late May and June to beat the anticipated price rise.
A third-quarter dip is expected as the industry gets into mass vacations and a slowdown for auto change-overs.

WIDENING EDUCATIONAL HORIZONS

What, then lies ahead for the rural schools?
It has been realized in professional circles for some time that an educational crisis exists in the province, and it devolves upon the people and the Government of this Province to take action.
Evidence that the people are aware of this crisis is seen in the recent representation to the Government for a Royal Commission on education by the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation, supported by the Women's Institutes, the Federation of Agriculture, the Charlottetown Board of Trade, The Canadian Legion, the Catholic Women's League and the Home and School Association. Insofar as the Government is concerned, the recently appointed Select Standing Committee of the Legislature was empowered to receive and correlate briefs, petitions, views and opinions from all interest groups and individuals, and to make such inspections of actual school conditions as they see fit. (It reported to the Legislature April 3, 1957).

MUST REMAIN
Based upon the premise that the rural school must remain at all costs an integral part of the community, certain remedial steps suggest themselves, viz., Federal assistance, without infringement on provincial rights, a re-vamping of the School Tax structure, and teacher salary revision. An elaboration of these steps follows:
FEDERAL ASSISTANCE
The sovereign rights of the Provinces in matters educational must remain unchallenged, but if the Federal Government can make money available to universities it can and should recognize the financial needs of the Provinces vis-a-vis their primary and secondary schools, from which the universities obtain eventually both their professors and their students.
The report of the Gordon Commission clearly indicated the need for the Maritime provinces for financial assistance for Ottawa recognition of this need. It remains for the Provincial government to state its case for education, and request such assistance.
TAX STRUCTURE
Glaring anomalies and inequalities in the District supplements make it imperative for a revision of the present system. There is no justification for the payment of a supplement of, say \$450, to a Grade Eleven Permit teacher in one District, while a licenced teacher in a neighbouring district receives \$400 or less. By the same token, a man engaged in say truck-driving, with perhaps three or four children attending school pays only the statutory Poll Tax, whereas a childless couple wrestling a living from the soil would have to pay \$30 or \$40. In addition, the difficulty of obtaining School Tax payments from non-residents is a constant source of

frustration to every school secretary.
The solution to this anachronism lies in the elimination of District supplements together, with the payment in full of the teacher's salary by the Government. Federal assistance aforementioned could relieve taxpayers individually for this burden, while the District Trustees could retain their privileges of teacher selection and school moral supervision.
