TURGENEFF ABHORS SPORT.

How a Dying Pheasant Influenced His Whole Career.

The celebrated Russian novelist, Turgeneff, tells a most touching incident from his own life, which awakened in him sentiments that have colored all his writings with a deep and tender feeling.

When Turgeneff was a boy of 10, his father took him out one day bird shooting. As they tramped across the brown stubble a golden pheasant rose with a low whir from the ground at his feet, and with the joy of a sportsman throbbing his veins he raised his gun and fired, wild with excitement, when the creature fell fluttering at his side.

Life was ebbing fast, but the instinct of the mother was stronger than death itself, and with a feeble flutter of her wings the mother bird reached the nest where her young brood were huddled, unconscious of danger. Then, with such a look of pleading and reproach that his heart stood still at the ruin he had wrought, and never to his dying day did he forget the feeling of cruelty and guilt that came to him in that moment.

Applause in Spanish Theaters.

Thumbcrews.

William Carstairs, the Scotch divine who for 14 years served William III as confidential secretary and adviser in chief, had been implicated in the Rye House plot, a conspiracy to assassinate Charles II and place Monmouth on the throne. He was put to the excruciating torture of the thumbkins, or thumb-screws, which he endured heroically, without confessing or implicating others.

After Carstairs became the private adviser of William he was presented with the instrument by which he had been tortured. The king, wishing to see the measure of fortitude necessary to endure the terrible torture without making a confession of some sort, placed his thumbs in the machine and told Carstairs to turn the screw. He turned slowly and cautiously. "It is unpleasant," said King William, "yet it might be endured. You are trifling with me. Turn the screw so that I may really feel pain similar to that you felt."

Carstairs turned the screw sharply. The king cried out, and when released said that under such pain he would have confessed to anything, true or false.

A Monster Palace.

Spain possesses one of the largest buildings in the world. It is a

palace, a museum, a library, a picture gallery, a monastery, a church and a burial place. This wonderful edifice is called the Escorial, although the name is very generally corrupted both in England and America into "Escurial."

The Escorial was commenced in 1563 by order of Philip II of Spain and was intended partly as a royal burying place for the kings of Spain and partly as a commemoration of Philip's victory over the French at St. Quentin in 1557. It is built entirely of granite and measures 744 feet in length by 580 feet in breadth. At each corner is a tower 200 feet in height. The building is supposed to represent an enormous gridiron lying upside down, and this shape is believed to have reference to St. Lawrence, who was martyred on a gridiron.

Queen Wilhelmina's Oath.

The coronation of the young queen of Holland will take place, according to a recently published decree, on Sept. 6. On that day the young woman, with eight hand raised, in the presence of the states general, will pledge herself to the following formula, which is a strange contrast to the oaths administered to the Russian and German emperors:

"I swear to the people of the Netherlands to observe and always maintain the fundamental law. I pledge myself to defend and to preserve with all my power the independence of the kingdom, to protect public and private liberty and the rights of all my subjects and to employ for the preservation and advancement of individual and general prosperity all the means which the laws place at my disposal as the due of an upright queen. And may God aid me in my work."
