Ten Sufficient Reasons Why the Government Should be Sustained.

- 1. It is admitted by both parties that the present Government have been economical. 2. If they are not sustained there will be no inducement to practice economy. 3. The Government have encouraged agriculture as no previous Government ever did. 4. If they are not sustained, the electors will show that they do not care to have agriculture encouraged. 5. It is part of the Government Policy to reduce the Legislature. 6. If they are not sustained, taxpayers will show that they are quite willing to bear the present unnecessarily large expense of legislation. 7. It is desirable to prosecute diligently our claim to a share of the Fishery Award. 8. If the present Government are not sustained, the men who renounced that claim in 1873 will get into power; and every chance of obtaining it will be gone forever. 9. It is desirable that there should be no taxes to pay. 10. If the Government are not sustained, the first act of their opponents must be, on their own showing, to reenact the Assessment Act, which they say should never have been repealed.

A False Report Corrected.

The Oppositionists are reporting that the Government expended, during the first three months of this year, upwards of \$80,000!

Now a return, signed by the Provincial Auditor, and laid on the table of the House of Assembly on the 8th of April last, shows that the Government actually expended \$51,875.42!!

This amount, it will be remarked, is much less than a fourth of the estimated expenditure of the whole year: so that if the Government go on as they have begun, their expenditures of this year will be WELL WITHIN THE ESTIMATES!!!

As shown by a return of the late Provincial Auditor, Mr. Hyndman, the Davies Government expended, during the first three months of 1879, the sum of \$82,960.52, or over \$80,000 more than the present Government expended the first three months of 1882!!!

Taxpayers, which Government will you choose?

Why?—Oh! Why?

The Oppositionists are bringing the ex-Governor of the North-West Territories, and all the other big guns, to bear upon the Hon. Donald Ferguson. Mr. Laird, Mr. Peters, Mr. Warburton, and their unselfish compatriots say Mr. Ferguson "must be defeated." Electors, reflect a little. Why are these men so anxious to defeat Mr. Ferguson? The Opposition had nearly a week's start of the Government candidates, owing to the absence of Mr. Lafargey, and at first were greatly sanguine of success; but now that Mr. Lafargey and Dr. Gillis have organized an active canvass, things have assumed a different appearance. The Opposition have virtually abandoned Mr. Allen, and are making a desperate effort to return Mr. McMillan. The friends of the Government are confident of retaining their two men, Lafargey and Gillis.

Come, then, to the front, Liberal-Conservative electors, and support this Government, which is essentially the one of your own creation! About four years ago you gave it the power to rule. This it has done, faithfully and well, as you expected it would do. As you wished:

- 1. It has not meddled in any way with the non-sectarian School Act.
- 2. It has reduced the expenses of Government to a minimum.
- 3. Its Public Accounts show that it has fed, instead of starved the Public Works, and yet at a much less cost to the taxpayer than in years gone by.
- 4. It has done more than almost any former Government to encourage the cause of Agriculture.
- 5. It has protected the mechanic and yet not infringed upon the just rights of any other class of the community.
- 6. By judicious action upon its part, as well as upon the part of its supporters, it has calmed the intolerance of Denominationalism.
- 7. It has reduced, so far as it had power, the expenses of Legislation and made a very great saving in the Administration of Justice Department.

Lastly, it has shown no fear of again meeting the electors at the polls, from the fact of its having passed resolutions in the Assembly, in the Session of 1881, to go before the people in that year, with the members of the Legislative Council, to test the question of one Chamber only for legislative purposes. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. INFERNAL MACHINES IN RUSSIA AND AMERICA. HANLAN WINS AGAIN.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

Moscow, April 30. A man named Kaboff Bugonowitsch recently submitted to authority a plan for an illumination of Keimlin with electric lights. Inquiries were instituted, and it was discovered that the intention was to blow up the whole Keimlin, during the festivities attending the coronation of the Czar. Bugonowitsch and 200 Nihilists have been arrested.

The Governor General has put a stop to the expulsion of Jews from Russia.

LONDON, April 30. Laycock has challenged Hanlan to row a race on the Thames championship course for £200 a side. Hanlan replied that he will sail for America on May 11th.

NEW YORK, April 30. Two packages addressed to Wm. H. Vanderbilt and Cyrus W. Field respectively, and which proved to contain infernal machines, exploded last night upon an elevated railway train while being conveyed in a mail bag. No serious damage was done.

To-day, John J. Davenport, reported to the police that he discovered fire in the entry of his house, evidently caused by the explosion of a similar contrivance. No clue to the sender of these machines has been obtained.

CONCORD, MASS., April 30. The last solemn rites over the remains of the late Ralph Waldo Emerson were held this afternoon. The town generally was draped in mourning, and manifestations of grief are everywhere displayed.

SACKVILLE, N. B., May 1. In the race to-day, Hanlan won by six lengths. He led from the start, and had it all his own way.
