Governor Will Open 5th Boy's Parliament Jan. 30

His Honour Lieutenant Governor F. W. Hyndman has consented to read the speech from the throne at the opening of the 5th Older Boys' Parliament which takes place on the evening of January 30th at the Legislative Assembly. The Speaker of the House will be James Norton. The clerk of the House, who in meetings such as these directs procedure, is David Hamilton, a theological student from Mount Allison University. Hugh MacLean will be premier and Vimy Gregory will be the leader of the Opposition. The director of the 1959 Parliament is Rev. Harold Mitton, Charlottetown Baptist Church. Devotional leaders will be Rev. Burton Crowe, Park Royal Church and Rev. R. S. Latimer, Trinity United Church and John Evans, general secretary of the YMCA. On Saturday evening a banquet will be held. The guest speaker on this occasion will be Dr. George Fisher, director of veterinary services for the province. Plans for the Parliament have been finalized with the committee adding the finishing touches to some last-minute legislation to be presented during the three-day session. Some of the questions expected to involve lively debate will deal with social problems of the day. The program also calls for discussion of inspirational topics. During the session, the boys will conduct the debates under strict parliamentary procedure that should prove valuable to them in future life. The planning committee reports mounting interest in this coming Parliament and predict that it will be one of the most successful to date.

Group Warned Of Dangers In Wiring Home

A warning of the danger of "do-it-yourself" home electrical installation was given to members at the regular meeting of the Irwin Christian Fellowship Thursday evening. The matter was brought up by John Kirby, electrical inspector, who chaired a panel discussion on the topic of "electricity." He told the group it was the job of the inspection staff to insure safety and satisfaction to the customer. In a summary Mr. Kirby outlined the history of electricity in Charlottetown. He described the role of the journeyman, contractor and inspector. He said well over 600 people in the city and surrounding areas owe their living directly to the electrical industry. Other members of the panel were Clinton MacLean, Vincent Newson and John Carr. Members made plans for the holding of a Valentine banquet and decided to continue monthly worship services at Riverside Hospital. Several new members were welcomed to the group.

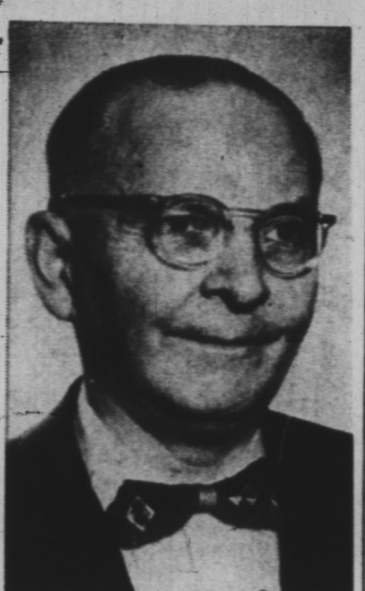

Protestant Orphanage Report Successful Financial Year

A total of \$45,203.41 was reported as receipts of the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage during 1958, according to a financial report submitted to the Orphanage Trustee Board by Mrs. H. S. Henderson at the January meeting. Of the total receipts \$16,746.56 was received for the endowment fund and \$28,456.85 for the maintenance of the home. The large number of children to be cared for and necessary repairs and replacements caused expenses to be heavy during the year, but Mrs. Henderson could report a small surplus after all accounts had been settled. Mrs. Henderson expressed gratitude to the generous people of the province, the many outstanding workers who gave freely of their time, to the clergy and press. The trustees thanked Mrs. Henderson for her comprehensive report and for the thirty years of devoted service she has given to orphanage work.

Former Islander Is Honored On Retirement From Position

A former Prince Edward Island man, John M. Matheson, was honored on retirement by the staff of the Alberta department of child welfare recently. He had served as inspector for a period of 22 years. Ray G. Hagen, deputy minister of public welfare, presented Mr. Matheson with a chair and fountain pen from branch heads and departmental staff members. The deputy congratulated Mr. Matheson on his record of long and faithful service. A native of Rose Valley, Prince Edward Island, Mr. Matheson went to Western Canada in 1914. The next year, he was employed at the Macdonald Hotel which had just been opened. After various jobs in the city, he joined the provincial government service in 1936. He was in the public works department for a short time, transferring to the child welfare branch where he had remained since. Mr. Matheson lives at 10520, 92 St., and will continue to make his home in Edmonton. Mrs. Matheson, the former Phoebe Blodun of Glen Valley, P. E. Island, died in 1953.
