## Standing Ovation Given U.S. Band

**CONTRACTS AWARDED** — C.M. Drury federal industry Minister announced yesterday that a number of Prince Edward Island firms have been awarded contracts by the Department of Defence production.

Canada Packers Ltd. of Charlottetown was awarded a \$12,869 contract for the supply of poultry during the month ending August 31 this year; Island Poultry Co. of Summerside was awarded a \$31,500 contract for the supply of liquefied gas during the period August 31, 1966 to May 31, 1967; and Large and Co. of Charlottetown were awarded an \$18,500 contract for the supply of coal during the year ending July 31, 1967. The contracts were among 118 unclassified contracts, totalling almost \$10 million, awarded by the department.

A rare treat is in store for P.E.I. movie goers this week, with the motion picture "The Property Is Condemned" opening tonight at the North River Drive-In theatre.

This will be the Canadian premiere of the motion picture, which features in its cast Kate Reid, who is currently appearing in "The Ottawa Man" and "Turvey" at the Charlottetown Summer Festival.

Miss Reid shares the billing with Natalie Wood, Robert Redford and Charles Bronson in the Paramount Pictures production of "The Property Is Condemned", based on a one-act play of the same name by the celebrated American playwright, Tennessee Williams, author of "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof" and many, many more.

ATTENDS SCREENING — Miss Reid, along with other members of the 1966 Summer Festival company attended a special screening of the picture at the Capitol Theatre, through the courtesy of Edward Mullis, manager of the theatre. pletely destroyed by her mother, played by Kate Reid.

Miss Reid runs a sleepy boarding house in the town, living off rounders, and using her daughter for bait. The town is virtually destroyed when Redford lays off the men, resulting from cutbacks in rail service during the depression, and the story winds its way into the futile attempts made to pick up the threads of life.

"This Property Is Condemned" contains all the traditional Tennessee Williams insight into human nature and the raw facts of life; and sordidness is mixed with sweetness and bitterness with love.

As to Miss Reid's performance, she was nothing less than excellent as the slowly, course grasping mother and with amazing ability was alternately able to arouse pity and hatred for herself from the audience, even combining these with a slight touch of humor at her crudeness.

Speaking as one, not of the world of the theatre, it was quite exciting to watch "This Property Is Condemned", a top "Hollywood" production knowing that one of the principals was sitting in the same theatre and certainly any Islander who sees this film this week will have somewhat the same feeling.

## Canadian Expelled From Congo

KINSHASA, The Congo (Reuters) — The Congolese government has ordered the expulsion of Canadian Arnold Amber, Reuters correspondent in this city formerly known as Leopoldville. A British businessman-journalist also was ordered expelled.

Lt. Col. Alexandre Singa, chief of the national Surete, told the Canadian Embassy Sunday that Amber, 26, of Montreal, must be on a plane for Europe today.

He told Amber he had done some "tendentious reporting" in covering the recent mutiny of Katangese troops in the north-eastern region.

Freedom of the press was allowed in The Congo but reporters had to conform to official government releases and sources, he said.

As yet no formal expulsion order has been handed over to Amber or the Canadian Embassy.

The businessman, John Latz, has lived in the Congo since 1949. He also acts as part-time correspondent for The Associated Press and the London Daily Telegraph.

Relations between President Mobutu's government and the foreign press corps became strained in early June over coverage of the trial and public execution of four former cabinet ministers for allegedly plotting to overthrow the government.

About 20 foreign journalists have been expelled by The Congo since it achieved independence six years ago.

Amber is married and has a 10-month-old daughter. His family is expected to follow him out of the country later this week.

## Fulton Lewis Jr. Dies At Age 63

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fulton Lewis Jr., radio commentator and columnist, died early Sunday at Doctor's Hospital here. He was 63.

Lewis, a national affairs commentator for the Mutual Broad-

casting system since 1957, had undergone surgery for pancreatitis and suffered a massive heart attack Saturday night. A second attack caused his death. Survivors include his wife, Alice, and two children. Lewis was a war correspondent in the Second World War and was active in touring radio galleries in the House and Senate.
