

Oil Search Crew In West Prince

The search for oil on Prince Edward Island moves into Western Prince County today when the preliminary survey work for the Standard Oil Company of California gets underway.

About fifteen men, three house trailers and a variety of trucks and equipment arrived in Alberton during the weekend.

The nature of the work to be carried out at the present time could not be learned last evening but is expected to take between two to four weeks.

An office has been set up in the Burke building on Main Street and the crews are billeted in various places in the town. The trailers are located adjacent to Rix's Garage.
