Minister Hopes RCAF Will Continue Flights

SUMMERSIDE — Dr. Hubert MacNeill, minister of health and welfare, said yesterday morning that "there is no commercial organization on Prince Edward Island that will make mercy flights to Halifax and that it is his feeling that the RCAF should continue the service."

"The service rendered Islanders by the RCAF in the past has been very much in demand, and greatly appreciated," he said. "To my knowledge reports that mercy flight services would at any time be discontinued are incorrect."

"I don't think people can afford to pay the \$50 an hour rate asked by Atlantic Central Airways," the doctor said. "I feel if the service had not been offered, RCAF mercy flights in our area would have continued without incident."

Dr. MacNeill last week met with Group Captain Lee, RCAF public relations special assistant in Ottawa and presented the case for P.E.I. residents.

"I explained to G-C Lee that the provincial government and Island citizens were very concerned over the outcome of the mercy flight situation," Dr. MacNeill said.

Those special planes and equipment are unused most of the time and it costs the taxpayer nothing extra to have his air force available in emergency cases. There is no reason why it should be restricted to the armed forces in time of peace."

Dr. MacNeill declined comment on Dr. Sinnott's letter, saying: "I don't know I am in a position to comment on the duties and functions of the air force."

Traffic Accidents Keep Police Busy

A total of seven accidents were reported to the Summerside town police are investigating six, all of which have happened since Friday.

If this rate were to keep up the accident toll during safe driving week would reach an all time high for the Prince County area.

At 8:50 Friday the Summerside RCMP were called to investigate a head-on collision on the military road leading to RCAF Summerside which saw both vehicles sustain extensive damage, but no injuries to occupants of the vehicles.

A 1959 Pontiac, was driven by Jeffrey Parker while the other, a 1961 station wagon was operated by PO Bursney of the RCAF Station.

Earlier in the day the detachment investigated an accident on Wellington when a 1962 coupe driven by Barbara MacNeill of O'Leary went out of control due to slippery conditions and struck a 1953 panel owned by Bernard Beagle of Summerside, parked on the shoulder of the highway. Estimated damage to both vehicles was \$300.

Earlier in the day the detachment investigated five accidents since Friday, the worst being a head-on collision between a 1963 Rambler driven by Jennie Mutart of Cape Traverse and a late model half-ton truck operated by Ed MacLellan, Charlottetown.

A passenger of the Mutart driver vehicle, Bill Hill, was taken to Prince County Hospital suffering from lacerations to the head, broken ribs and a bruised lung.

Damage in the five accidents was in the thousands of dollars. No injuries were sustained in the other accidents.

Three of the six accidents in town police were of a minor nature while the vehicles involved in the other three sustained considerable damage.

Friday evening at approximately 7:45 a 1962 Volkswagen driven by Jerry Keith White, Summerside, was in collision with a 1956 motor driven by Mrs. Ida Arsenault at the corner of Fitzroy and Summer Streets. The vehicles sustained approximately \$200 damage.

At approximately 5:15 the same evening a 1957 model car operated by Isla Mae Woodside of Summerside struck the rear of a 1953 model driven by Euclid Edmond Bernard, Wellington, at the corner of Noonan and Water streets, causing in the vicinity of \$175 damage to both vehicles.

Another rear end collision between a vehicle driven by William Holten Cameron and one driven by Robert Francis Stamp, both of Summerside, caused approximately \$150 damage.

Gordon Ripley, fieldman with the division of research, gave a report of the study that will be carried on through the smaller groups. Technical help from the department will be made available along with guest speakers and films.

Walter Christopher reported for the nominating committee and the following officers were elected: David Harper, president; Mrs. Reg Eldershaw, secretary; Gerald Keough, Mark Gallant and Edward McAluff to a steering committee.

Chairman appointed to head the various committees were: the fisheries, Terry Gavin; agriculture, Gerald Handrahan; tourism, Mrs. Joseph Conway; new industry, Mrs. James A'Hearn; education, David Harper; recreation, Gerald Keough; beautification, Marcel Perry.

Mr. Ripley introduced the guest speaker of the evening, Graeme Linklater, Prince County agriculture representative, who spoke on farm management.

"It is now," he said, "the farmer should take a good look at how he is progressing on the farm; up to date records should be kept."

On P.E.I. he said farmers are producing about half of what they should be. He spoke of pasture lands in Quebec, Nova Scotia and the Island.

A farm management meeting will be held at Alberton, Dec. 9 and farmers interested should attend. The Tignish study group which will meet again Dec. 27 is open to all interested in the development of the Tignish area.

Two films were shown during the evening on community posture and "Our Island Home".
