OTTAWA (CP)—Canada led the world in trade last year on a per capita basis, the bureau of statistics estimated Tuesday.

Her exports and imports, reaching all-time highs, worked out to an average of \$67.21 for each Canadian, up from \$57.38 in 1955 and the previous high of \$47.81 in 1953.

Canada held this top spot in 1953 but lost it to New Zealand in 1954 and 1955. New Zealand dropped to second place last year when she clamped on import curbs.

In over-all trade, Canada held her rank as fourth among the world leaders, surpassed only by the United States, Britain and West Germany.

Canadian exports rose by 11.8 per cent to a record \$4,863,100,000 from \$4,351,300,000 in 1955. Her imports swelled by 21.1 per cent to \$10,568,600,000 from \$8,683,700,000.

However, the increased emphasis on imports boosted her foreign debt. The Canadian deficit in foreign trade climbed to an unprecedented \$423,300,000, more than double the \$361,100,000 deficit in 1955.

As usual, the U.S. and Britain were her main trading partners. Of Canada's total imports, 73 per cent was supplied by the U.S., down a shade from 73.3 in 1955. The percentage coming from Britain remained unchanged at 8.5 while that coming from Europe increased to 5.2 from 4.3.

KILLED OWN CHILD. HANNOVER, Germany (AP)—A British military court Tuesday sentenced Mrs. Hilda Bird, 28, wife of a British Army sergeant stationed in West Germany, to life imprisonment for the slaying of her four-year-old daughter Fances last April 18.

Her trial was the first under a new law enacted last year making dependents of British servicemen stationed abroad subject to court martial for crimes committed abroad.

FARMER INJURED BY EXPRESS TRAIN. NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP)—Charles Hackett, 44, suffered a skull fracture Tuesday when struck by the Canadian National Railway's Maritime express proceeding to Halifax from Montreal. The accident occurred while he was driving cows away from the track.

His condition in hospital here was reported fairly good although he had not fully regained consciousness. The train was moving slowly because of the wandering cows.

MARK SEEN STABLE. BONN, Germany (Reuters)—The West German government said Tuesday that all rumors of an upward adjustment in the exchange value of the Deutsche mark are groundless. A government spokesman told a press conference that the West German cabinet had discussed the international currency situation in the presence of leading officials of the federal bank.

ISLAND IN DESERT. This boycott has served to keep Israel completely cut off from the Arab world. There is no trade, no normal movement of persons back and forth, no telephone or cable communications between Israel and the Arab states. No mail moves back and forth.

Arab markets are closed to foreign companies dealing with Israel. The boycott office gives three months notice to such companies to close their branches in Israel. Some British petroleum distributing companies closed their Israeli branches recently in response to this pressure.

Arab states blacklist ships which enter Israeli ports on the same voyage in which they stop at Arab ports. World tourist ships are exempted.

Airlines whose planes land in Israel during Middle Eastern trips are denied the right not only to land at Arab airports but also to fly over Arab territory.

No Arab state will grant a visa to a foreigner if he carries an Israeli visa in his passport. Some Arab states, like Jordan and Syria, forbid foreigners of Jewish faith to enter their territories.

Killed in Car, Tractor Crash. PETITCODIAC, N.B. (CP)—Arnold Branscombe, 23, a Corn Hill resident, was killed Tuesday when a farm tractor and a car collided on the Petitcodiac-Havelock highway. The tractor, driven by a brother of the victim, ever turned and crushed him.

Arab Refugees From Israel Continue To Nurse Grudge. By WILTON WYNN. CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—A group of Arab refugees in a United Nations camp marched with banners in the file to the United Nations office. After shouting the customary slogans, they pelted the office with rocks. Police rushed in to restore order.

What was the trouble? Word had got round the camp that Canada and the United States were ready to accept a limited number of Arab refugee immigrants. The refugees started throwing rocks in protest.

They preferred life in their tent camp, with its bitter cold in winter and burning heat in summer, with its hardships and meagre United Nations rations, to life in Canada or the United States. And all because they think one day they will return to their homes across the frontier is what now is the state of Israel.

BASIS FOR HOPE. Nearly 1,000,000 of them have waited in this way for nine years, ever since the Palestine war of 1948. How have they kept their hopes alive through those years of misery? Their young firebrands have a ready answer—as soon as Gamal Abdel Nasser gets enough Russian arms, Arabs will strike at Israel and drive the hated state into the sea.



THE LATE DR. BEER

Retired City Dentist Dies

The death of Clifton Holland Beer, D.D.S., occurred at the Livingstone-MacArthur Nursing Home, St. Avars, early on the morning of Saturday, August 17th. Prominent in professional and sporting circles, the late Doctor Beer practised dentistry in this city for a period of fifty years. At the time of his death he was in his 78th year.

Dr. Beer was born in Charlottetown in 1880 and was the son of the late F. Herbert Beer and Mrs. Beer, the former Margaret MacKechnie. In his youth the late Dr. Beer attended West Kent School and Prince of Wales College. Later he enrolled at Indiana University where on completion of his studies he was granted the degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery. Dr. Beer practised his profession briefly in Louisville, Ky. before returning to commence practicing in his native city.

In 1905 the late Dr. Beer was married to Isobel May MacGregor. She died in 1940. He is survived by his son, S.S. Robert MacKechnie Beer, who is attached to the RCAF's Fighter Control Branch. S-L Beer has been a member of the RCAF since 1937. In addition there are left to mourn his passing his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Robert Beer, the former Olivia Moore, his brother and his wife Mr. and Mrs. Fred Beer of Los Altos, California; and two grandsons, Douglas and Fred. Dr. Beer's second wife, the former Ina Gillan, R.N. of Charlottetown, whom he married in 1942, predeceased him six years ago.

The late Dr. Beer was a life-long member of the Old Methodist Church, Charlottetown, was one of the founders of the Charlottetown Men's Club, a charter member of the Golf Club, a member of the Masonic Order and the Oddfellow's. During his active years the late Charlottetown dentist was a keen sportsman and devoted much of his leisure time to hunting and fishing.

Falling health forced him to give up his practice in 1951. At that time he took up residence with his son, living in such widespread areas as Florida, Ottawa and Chatham. Wishing to spend his final years in his native province, Dr. Beer returned home in 1954.

His funeral took place Monday afternoon from the MacLean Funeral Home. Services were conducted by Rev. Dr. A.S. Weir, Interment was in the Sherwood Cemetery. Pall bearers were: Messrs. J.A. Lawson, F.A. Large, L.E. Wellner, Ron Parker, J.A. Fullerton, G.G. Hughes.

Labrador At Resolute Bay

OTTAWA (CP)—The navy Arctic patrol ship, HMCS Labrador, Tuesday reached Resolute Bay, 490 miles north of the Arctic Circle, in an effort to find a navigable northwest passage.

The Labrador, commanded by Capt. T. C. Pullen of Oakville, Ont., and Halifax, heads a survey group in the Bellot Strait as part of the Arctic task force of the U.S. navy's military sea transport service.

Blasts Rip New Tanker

MARSEILLE, France (AP)—Two explosions ripped through the huge new oil tanker World Splendor off Gibraltar Tuesday and set the vessel aflame. Several casualties were reported and the chief officer was listed as missing.

The 40,000-ton tanker, owned by the Nearchos group and flying the Liberian flag, was taken in tow late in the day and is expected to reach Marseille early Thursday.

A late message received here did not indicate whether the fire was put out when the tanker was taken in tow. Reports from Casablanca and the Nearchos offices in London indicated most of the crew of 81 was picked up by rescue ships.

A company spokesman said nine crew members remained aboard to handle the ship when it was taken in tow. He said the chief officer is believed to be missing and that there were other casualties, but did not give the number.

Man Kills Himself, Wife, Child In Fire

ST. HYACINTHE, Que. (CP)—A man in a "frenzy of fear" because of an impending mental examination topped off a fire Tuesday that killed himself, his wife and one of his six children.

Police watched helplessly outside as the man soaked his clothes and the house in which he had barricaded himself with gasoline and set it afire. Killed in the fire were Georges Allard, 37, his wife Lucille, 34, and their son Claude, 12.

A daughter, Michelle, 10, was rescued from the burning building and taken to hospital where her condition was described as serious. Allard's four other children were outside when the fire started.

St. Hyacinthe police sergeant George Vanasse and three constables went to the Allard home early Tuesday to take the man into custody pending a mental examination. They found the doors and windows barricaded with furniture. They said Allard threatened to kill his whole family if they tried to arrest him.

Find Missing Civilian Plane

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The civilian aircraft was piloted by Peter Lorenz of Burbank, California. The navigator was not identified.

A 14-day search failed to uncover any trace of the aircraft after it disappeared in a snowstorm. It was found Tuesday by a detachment of the RCAF ground observer corps, about 10 miles south of St. Anne-des-Montes.

Canadian Dollar At New Premium

NEW YORK (AP)—The high-flying Canadian dollar rose to an unprecedented premium of more than six cents over the U.S. dollar in foreign exchange trading Tuesday.

At \$1.06 1-32 in terms of U.S. currency, the Canadian dollar was up 3-32 of a cent over Monday's close. Last Thursday the Dominion dollar broke through record high, which had stood since November, 1953.

The strength in Canadian money was attributed in part to reports that British, French and West German investors have been stepping up their investments in Canadian enterprises. The recent influx of European money is in addition to the steady stream of U.S. investment in Canada in recent years.

Suggests Market For Half Million Bushels Of Grain

The five breweries in the Maritimes and our own company use some half-million bushels of grain annually. Presently this grain is being imported from Western Canada. We like to think that it could be produced and purchased right here.

L.J. McGuinness, President of McGuinness Distillers Limited, Bridgetown, N.S., told the Guardian yesterday afternoon. We use about 100,000 bushels a year ourselves and we hope that in future we can procure it in the Maritimes, he added. We

buy it from Western Canada now, said. Asked how much Rye it took to produce a certain quantity of Rye whiskey, Mr. McGuinness said that a bushel of rye grain would produce three gallons of Rye whiskey.

The occasion was a visit by Mr. McGuinness and many interested Prince Edward Island people to Mermaid where Leo P. McIsaac and his brother-in-law, Jack Keenan are preparing to harvest more than four hundred acres of Fall Rye which they are growing on contract for the McGuinness people. It is the first time that such a thing has been attempted here and Mr. McIsaac and Mr. Keenan are happy about the development thus far.

Fall Rye is usually sown not later than the last of September, but there are exceptions. Last fall, for example, they were unable to seed one field until the 3rd of November. It was just coming through the ground when it was covered by winter. But the crop today is very good with prospects of a yield of thirty-five bushels to the acre.

20 TO 50 BUSHELS

Asked about the yield, he expected from the crop in general this year, Mr. McIsaac said that he expected that it would run all the way from twenty to fifty bushels per acre. In addition to the McIsaac farm of about 100 acres, they have rented for the project. Most of the land is in the Mermaid-Cleintown area but there is 100 acres at Commercial Cross.

From a distance the grain looked ripe enough yesterday to cut but an examination of the kernels indicated that it would be at least a week before harvesting operations can get underway. Those in attendance represented many phases of the province's economy. Premier A. Matheson and his Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Eugene Cullen, were there. Charles Yeo, Sherbrooke, is chairman of the agriculture committee of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council. He is also a past president of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture.

Frank W. Curtiss is a past president of the Board of Trade and is also on the executive of Apec. GRAIN QUALITY. Bruce MacLaren, cerealist at the Experimental Farm and Dick Sterling also from the Farm had a special interest in the quality of the grain. George Whitehead is the soil specialist at the Farm.

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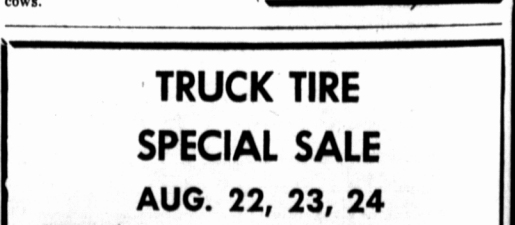
