## Cooking School Will Feature New Appetizers

Round the clock entertaining often calls for tempting appetizers that will delight both men and women. Excellent for quick and easy appetizer preparation are versatile table-ready meats. They can easily be cut into interesting sizes and shapes and are a most economical meat choice.

Braunschweiger liver sausage is a favourite table-ready meat that can be served in many elegant ways. Make entertaining easier by preparing an unusually attractive appetizer in the form of a Braunschweiger pineapple, made from liver sausage and cut pimento olives. This is ideal for a tasty serve-yourself appetizer and is always a popular combination.

To fashion the pineapple, remove the covering from 1 1/4 pounds of top quality liver sausage and mold and shape it with your hands until it resembles a fresh pineapple. Then, cut the surface in diamond shapes and brush lemon juice over it to prevent darkening. Arrange slices of pimento olives in rows in the center of each diamond shape to make the "eyes" of the pineapple. ## Canadian Grandmother Is Woman Delegate To U.N.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) A silver-haired grandmother who lives on a farm near Brampton, Ont., is the only woman on Canada's delegation at the United Nations General Assembly.

Mrs. Jack Houck, president of the Ontario Women's Liberal Association, represents Canada on the U.N.'s Third committee, which deals with social, humanitarian and cultural matters.

"We help women and children," explained the matronly Mrs. Houck, whose previous public service included membership on the Ontario Hope education commission.

WORKS FOR PEACE  
"Our committee also helps raise standards of living. I believe that in the end that sort of work will do more for peace than all the politics that can be brought to bear."

Mrs. Houck is the mother of five children and the grandmother of eight. She and her husband, who is 61, both were born in the United States. They met while students at Cornell University and moved to a farm near Niagara Falls, Ont., soon after their marriage in 1918.

She'll be in New York until the UN General Assembly adjourns in December. Then what? "I think my husband would be quite happy if I stayed at home for a few months and just kept house."

While in New York, Mrs. Houck keeps in touch with her family by letter and telephone. Her husband calls her every Sunday night.

"We talk over the week's happenings," she said in an interview at the UN building.

RUNNING COMMENTARY  
"I have also begun to write a weekly family letter—a sort of running commentary on my activities at the UN. I have six copies made, and send one to each of the children and my husband."

She also writes a UN column for four weekly newspapers in her country—two in Brampton, one in Port Credit and one in Streetsville.

Since arriving in New York some three weeks ago she has limited her outside activities to visiting a few stores—"I'm not a great shopper"—and going to one movie.

"I have been pretty well absorbed in the UN work," she explained, "partly because I feel that being a newcomer I should learn all that I can as fast as I can."
