Provincial livestock director Lou Roper said yesterday that it is a danger of cholera spreading into this province as long as "extreme care is exercised by local growers. Mr. Roper emphasized that the great danger lies in the feeding of untreated garbage to hogs. "If the stuff is well cooked before feeding there is little danger of the disease breaking out here," he said. "If any animals were to become infected, he said, they would be immediately killed, burned and the remains buried, he noted.
