Alleged Poisoning.

A STE CUNEGONDE MAN DIES FROM POISON
HIS WIFE ACCUSED—INDICATIONS OF A
DIABOLICAL MURDER.

MONTREAL, June 12.

Great excitement was created in the vil-
lage of Ste. Cunegonde by the report of a
poisoning case. It appears that this after-
noon about three o'clock Josephine March-
and appeared at the Police Court, accom-
panied by two friends of the deceased, and
swore an information against Mrs. Dufort
for poisoning her husband. She stated
that she had been living in the same house
with the Duforts. In November last Mrs.
Dufort showed her a package she said she
had picked up from the floor. It had a
death's head on it, and was marked
"poison." Mrs. Dufort, who could not
read, asked the meaning of the words.
When she was told, she crumpled
the paper up in her hand and
kept it. Shortly before this she had
taken Mrs. Marchand that she intended
to poison her husband. Miss Marchand
said that the paper contained sugar of lead,
and that a dose was administered to the
husband in a cup of tea, and that she saw
some of the sediment that remained in the
cup. Another dose was given in a sand-
wich of head cheese and bread. Miss
Marchand further said that it was her be-
lief that poison was given in small doses
till the man died. Miss Marchand and her
friends saw Coroner Jones and requested
that an inquest be held. Their request
will be complied with. Tabian Dufort,
brother of the deceased, is reported as
saying that Mrs. Dufort had time and again
asked him to promise to marry her if she
would poison his brother. His brother
had been ill more or less for some time,
and was dejected in spirits. He had told
him that he was afraid to eat any
food prepared by his wife. His brother
died in the greatest pain, frothing
at the mouth. After he was
dead his legs and arms had to be fractured to
get him in his coffin. Before the last breath
was out of his mouth, she began moving the
household effects, and they were all removed
by midnight. She did not stay in the house
with the corpse, and was actually bargaining
to dispose of it to a doctor when the Grand
Trunk Benefit Society, of which he was a
member, took the burial arrangements upon
itsself. A month or so ago she had offered
her husband a cup of milk, but he refused to
take it. Subsequently it was given to two
cats and they immediately were taken with
violent pains, and one subsequently died.
The body of deceased will be taken from the
vault, and an inquest held to-morrow.

Beer of German manufacture has for
some time past been conveyed in large

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, June 15.

Advices from Cairo state that all Euro-
peans have left there except the staff of the
Eastern Cable Co., who have been advised to
quit.

A later despatch says the Cable Co. office
has been closed.

WASHINGTON, June 15.

Rear Admiral Nicholson, commanding
the European squadron, states that he tele-
graphed the Navy Department that all
vessels of the squadron, now on the Medi-
terranean, are receiving orders to proceed
to Alexandria to look after American inter-
ests there.

ALEXANDRIA, June 15.

The number of Europeans killed on Sun-
day is now estimated at 250. Many were
thrown into the sea and are being daily
washed ashore.

CAIRO, June 15.

The panic here is becoming worse hourly.
The shops are all closed. Some French-
men, unable to leave, are fortifying them-
selves in their houses.

PLYMOUTH, June 15.

The iron troop ship "Tamar" has sailed
for Malta, taking a detachment of marines
to reinforce the Mediterranean squadron.
It is believed she will convey troops from
Malta to Alexandria if necessary.

PARIS, June 15.

Troops at Marseilles and Toulon have
been ordered to make ready for immediate
embarkation.

WINCHESTER, Ky., June 15.

Ten negro men and one white woman,
employed on the railway, and occupying a
cabin in the bed of Two Mile Creek, were
drowned by the cabin being swept off by a
swiftly rising flood.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., June 15.

By an explosion of gas at Stanton air
shaft, this morning, one miner was killed
and four others probably fatally burned.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., June 15.

B. F. Arthur, a Holyoke druggist, has
entered a suit in \$25,000 in the Hampden
County Superior Court, against the Boston
Herald publishers, for false, malicious and
defamatory libel.

WINNIPEG, Man., June 15.

The Hanlan-Ross race has been aban-
doned. Ross, who will not claim a forfeit
of the deposit, has been presented with a
thousand dollars for an exhibition here.

A race will probably be arranged here in
October.

TORONTO, June 15.

Hanlan is still very sick. Drs. Mac-
Farlane and Strange certify that he is con-
fined to his bed by typhoid fever, and that
he will not be able to commence training
for two months.

LONDON, June 15.

A despatch from Paris says identical en-
ergetic instructions have been sent to French
and English Consuls and Admirals in regard
to protection to be afforded Europeans in
Egypt. The British channel fleet sailed east
this morning.

SMITH'S FERRY, Pa., June 15.

The Weeden-Mahony prize fight was fought
this morning, and was declared a draw after
the forty-first round.

CINCINNATI, June 15.

A very heavy rain fell here on Wednesday,
and at night a remarkable electrical storm
with heavy rain prevailed. Reports from
Southern Ohio and Indiana show heavy rain
with wind in many places. Much damage
was done to crops, five thousand acres of corn
were overthrown near Lawrenceburg, Ind.
Trains were delayed by washouts.
