"FREIGHT CAR DERAILED — A freight car of the Canadian National Railways went off the track at Augustus Station near Pisquid West yesterday afternoon, while the engine of the Georgetown train was hauling the Murray Harbour freight from Lake Verde to Mount Stewart. The accident caused a delay of two hours in the arrival of the train at Montague where it is due at 5:25. Since the closing of the Hillsboro Bridge to train traffic, all freight from the Murray Harbour line has been taken from Lake Verde Junction to Charlottetown. A recent announcement by the C.N.R. declares the closing of the Lake Verde-Southport line entirely, so that all traffic will, it is understood, go via Mount Stewart. There was no damage to the freight car, and it was put back on the tracks by the train crew, after which the train proceeded to Mount Stewart.

Mrs. Bruce MacPherson of Winsloe is spending a happy holiday at Murray Harbour where she is the guest of her mother, Mrs. Milton White.

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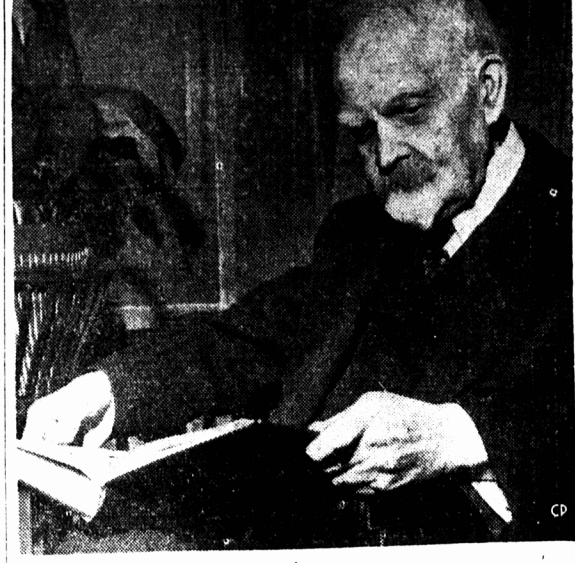
