## P.E.I. Follows Suit In Gas Price Drop

The Island has fallen into line with gasoline price reductions which have now gone into effect all through the Maritimes. Imperial Oil made the original increase of 3.5 cents per gallon last week. The P.E.I. has so far had the largest cutbacks to date with a drop of 1.9 cents per gallon, bringing the retail price to 46.4 cents per gallon.

In several island stations a decrease of 1.5 cents on the gallon has been reported, and the other outlets which have until now not dropped the price are expected to follow suit shortly.

General overproduction in the industry was given as the reason for the lessened prices yesterday by an Imperial Oil Company representative in Charlottetown.

There is also a decrease in the price of gas going to the farm with a pump in his yard. The Charlottetown Island sales representative for Canadian Oil Corp.

And Ralph Irtzsch of Petrofina in Charlottetown added that although his company has lowered the price on gasoline, the price of fuel and stove oil has experienced an increase of one tenth of a cent. Other Charlottetown representatives report a common trend in that area.

Diesel fuel has dropped 1.2 cents in the Charlottetown district.

## Popular Couple Leaves Souris For N.S. Job

**SOURIS** — A local couple, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hennessy have moved to Truro, N.S., where Mr. Hennessy will be employed by Co-operative Insurance Co. of Canada.

The herd of Almond Wood and Sons, Little Roy produced these records: Greenwood View Gem with 10,394 pounds milk, 422 fat for breed class averages of 123 milk, 25 fat in the class for cows 10 years and over; Bonnie Choice with 13,400 milk, 347 fat for BCAs of 133 and 154 in the mature class; East River Sheila with 10,638 milk, 437 fat for BCAs of 130 and 133 as a senior 3-year-old; East River Peach with 10,667 milk, 449 fat for BCAs of 130 and 149 as East River Merry Maid with 10,354 milk, 423 fat for BCAs of 130 and 144 as junior 2-year olds. East River Pansy's Fairy produced 9,443 milk, 464 fat for BCAs of 128 and 132 as a senior 2-year old.

W.A. Moore and Son, Kensington, had Cloverview, Marilyn Gem with 10,394 pounds milk, 422 fat for BCAs of 130 and 133 in the mature class; Cloverview, Snowbird with 11,392 milk, 422 fat for BCAs of 141 and 146, and Cloverview, Marcha with 10,191 milk, 437 fat for BCAs of 149 and 143 as junior 2-year olds.

The Experimental Farm Charlottetown had Charlottetown Nighthawk produce 11,919 milk, 609 fat for BCAs of 133 and 132 in the mature class; Charlottetown, Patsy produced 10,470 milk, 492 fat for BCAs of 130 and 149 as a senior 4-year old.

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## The Dream of HAROLD WILSON

"When I grow up," said the remarkable youngster to his mother, "I wish to be Prime Minister." Thirty-eight years later Harold Wilson, now leading the Labor Party into the upcoming election campaign, may finally realize his childhood dream.
