THE Committee have secured subscriptions for \$20,000 towards the testimonial to Sir Hector Langavine. They will endeavour to secure another \$12,000 before closing the fund.

THREE hundred and fifty dollars were collected at a meeting Wednesday evening, at Halifax, in aid of a memorial hall in honor of Rev. James Black, founder of Methodism in these provinces.

THE political fight in New York State increases in warmth. Both parties are making most resolute efforts to secure victory. They feel that the whole future of the party may depend on the result.

IN consequence of the recent developments an order has been distributed in the Montreal City Hall announcing that any official found inebriate during business hours will be discharged peremptorily by the Mayor.

ON Thursday of last week, while Mr. Coates Carter, of Mansfield, Cumberland Co., was working at the back of a threshing, his left hand came in contact with the teeth, and the arm was cut entirely off above the elbow.

AN eccentric resident of Toronto, named James French, has consigned to London, eight barrels of Canadian apples, addressed to the following persons: Her Majesty the Queen, Hon. W. E. Gladstone, Genl. Sir Garnet Wolseley and Lord Dufferin.

ISAAC J. McLELLAN, a Hampton, N. B., farmer, jumped from a third story window of the Bangor House, St. John, late on Thursday night, while under the influence of liquor, and received injury which caused death shortly afterwards. The deceased was seventy-two years of age.

ADVICES from Panama state that the prospects of Peace in South America are beginning to look brighter. Chili having offered to pay four million dollars to Peru and two million to Bolivia in settlement of all claims, and to remain satisfied with the territory she now holds.

A GREAT six-days walking match was commenced at Madison Square Gardens, New York, at five minutes past 12 o'clock last night. The latest betting was—Two to one against Rowell and Hazel, three to one against Fitzgerald, eight to one against Noremac, Vint and Hughes, and ten to one against Hart and Herty.

MR. C. J. WYLD, the agent of the Quebec Wrecking Co., has received a communication from the foreman at the wrecked H. M. S. "Phoenix," at East Point, who states that the ship can be pumped out, and, with the aid of pontoons, will probably be raised. If this is done it will prove a handsome remuneration for the Wrecking Co., as she was purchased for a very small sum.

THE POTATOE TRADE.—Shippers will be interested in the following extract from a Boston trade circular of the 18th:—"The potatoe trade is in a very unsatisfactory condition. Receipts from New York State, Maine and all other small growers are less affected by the rot, and it is almost impossible to get a sound lot. The Maine arrivals are decidedly bad. Most of the cars shrink at least fifty per cent.—that is, half the car load is thrown away—and then what remains have to be sold at a very low price. The price for strictly sound potatoes is 70 to 75 cents a bushel, but sales range all the way from 25 to 50 cents for lots as they arrive."

NARROW ESCAPE.—On Friday last, Conductor McGowan had a narrow escape from losing either life or limbs. While hunting, a short distance from St. Nicholas Station, he lost his way in the woods. He ascended a tall tree to examine the lay of the forest, and discover the shortest way out. On gaining the top, he tree gave way and fell heavily to the ground. Fortunately, the conductor had the presence of another tree and grasped the branch of another tree and thus saved himself. IN THE SUPREME COURT.

In the matter of An Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the forty-fifth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, Chapter 23, intitled, "An Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies, and Trading Corporations, and of the President, Directors, and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, an Insolvent Banking Company.

And I do also order that the further hearing of the said order granted by me on the fifth day of September last past, as to the further payment by said contributories of the further sum of forty dollars per share be adjourned until Monday, the eleventh day of December next, then to take place at my Chambers, in the Law Courts Building, in said Province, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon, and I do further order that a copy of this order, together with a notice from the Liquidators of the said Company, specifying the amount due from such contributory, in respect of such call, be served on all such contributories by posting the same in a letter prepaid and registered in the General Post Office, in Charlottetown, in said Province, addressed to the party or parties contributories, at his, her or their last known address, or place of abode, or by the delivery thereof, severally, to the attorney of the party to be served.

And I do further order that a copy of this order be published in the Royal Gazette newspaper of said Province, and in THE EXAMINER and Patriot newspapers, published in Charlottetown in said Province, in the daily issues thereof, for two weeks from the date thereof.
