Blinding Blast From Gun Described By Toronto Man

TORONTO (CP) — Gordon Mitchell, 21, of Toronto, described here the last things he saw before he was blinded for life by a stranger who, for no apparent reason, shot him in the face with a shotgun last June.

Mr. Mitchell, married and the father of a 14-month-old daughter, was testifying at the preliminary hearing of Charles Kit Munroe, 21, of Toronto, charged with attempted murder and wounding in another incident on the morning of June 16.

Magistrate Joseph Addison committed Munroe, whose wife and three children live in Halifax for trial on both charges.

Mr. Mitchell said he and a friend, James Hall, had returned from a movie and were standing outside Mr. Hall's Toronto home when a stranger ran past them, came back, and stood about 10 feet away.

"He stood there for four or five seconds," said the witness. "He raised the gun. I was looking down the barrel. When he shot it felt like a hand hit me in the face. I put my hands over my face."

Blinded by SHOT

Mr. Mitchell, who was led to the witness stand, said he was totally blind as a result of the shooting, his hearing was impaired and his nerves affected.

Mr. Hall said the gunman did not speak, and shot the blast while holding the shotgun at his hip.

Police arrested Munroe at gun point on the street minutes later and recovered a loaded .40-70 shotgun with hammer cocked. Const. John Wilson said the suspect was carrying 12 .40-70 shotgun shells when arrested.

Before the shooting, John MacSporran, 61, of Toronto, had reported a man had stabbed him in the stomach.

Mr. Keith Wright, Munroe's mother, told Magistrate Addison her son had consumed about 24 ounces of gin while watching television on the night of June 15.
