

Harold MacLean Elected President of Islanders

Harold MacLean was last night elected president of the Prince Edward Island Hockey Club at a weekly meeting held in the gymnasium. Mr. MacLean, who is chairman of the Charlottetown grounds committee, stated that he did not know whether to thank the shareholders for his election or not but that he felt it was the club's duty to support the result which will be a successful operation.

Mr. MacLean said that in total children we have the material for tomorrow's hockey players. If we don't keep the interest of our youth will lose their enthusiasm in the sport which for many years has been a favorite among Islanders. The president stated that it was the intention of the club to give coach Hughie Campbell utmost support and hope that they could operate their business in a non-conflicting manner, with this year's team being winner all the way.

The eight-member executive was elected by ballot from a total of 20 nominees, eight of whom were

chosen by an appointment nominating committee and the five elected members of the board. After the meeting was over, they retired to a private office where they chose their own officers. 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Britain Claiming World's Biggest Hockey League

LONDON, (CP)—Britain is claiming the biggest hockey league of its class in the world.

J. P. Bunny Ahearne, a leading spirit in British hockey, makes the claim for the new 12-team British Ice Hockey League, made up of four English and eight Scottish teams.

The object is variety—and more fans.

"The fans have been asking for more teams," said Ahearne, secretary of the British Ice Hockey Association. "They claimed they were tired of five or six teams playing each other all winter."

"Well, we are giving them what they wanted. And while the public is notoriously fickle, we're keeping our fingers crossed."

20 YEARS' EXPERIENCE

Thus, the Canadian game that was imported to Britain commercially in the mid-30s again has reached the multi-team stage that the British sports fan gets in cricket, soccer and other main team attractions. After some hesitation about added travelling costs, England and Scotland have come together in a league involving two away trips for each team.

English league hockey had been moving closer and closer to extinction after starting boldly 20 years ago with 11 teams. Five were left last year and Streatham, from South London, pulled out after winning the honors. The club claimed that it couldn't meet rising costs on its rink capacity of 3,000 fans.

Brighton, another league pioneer, wavered, withdrew and then returned for a trial in the new league. On the other hand, Scottish hockey has been doing well on its more robust, if less polished, style of play.

No other changes are planned.

Bruins Battle To 5-3 Victory Over Rangers

BOSTON, (AP)—Don McKenney, 20-year-old rookie centre up from Hershey, scored his second goal of the night as the Bruins defeated the Rangers 5-3 in a game that was a battle of attrition.

McKenney scored his first goal of the night at 17:56 of the second period to bring Bruins from behind for the third time.

Earlier in the period New York tied the count 2-2 on Murphy's rebound shot at 8:46 and grabbed a temporary 3-2 edge on Camillo Henry's goal at 12:25.

Hughie Campbell, Copper Leyte Arrive In City

Hughie Campbell, Prince Edward Islanders newly appointed hockey coach, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon and attended the club's weekly meeting at the Forum later in the evening. Hughie, who last year coached the Glace Bay Miners during the latter part of the now defunct MMHL season, stated that he would not arrive in the city until Wednesday night, when the definite status of the league was known, as it was always possible to make definite arrangements with players who were of Allan Cup hockey standards.

However, he stated that he has several prospects in mind and a number who have already come to terms for the season's play. Some of last year's players are due to return. Buck Whitlock, Bob Gray and Lorne Hennessey will likely be turning out for Campbell's first Island training camp at the Forum today at 11:00 a.m.

Already a group of players are on their way to the province. Danny O'Connor, hard hitting 24-year-old, 185 pound defenceman who played with Islanders during last year's play-offs will be back. The Sudbury native, who played junior hockey with the Barrie Flyers, came to the local club from Soo Indians of the N.O.H.A.

14 Ladies, One Man In English Race

NEWMARKET, England (AP)—The Town Plate, the only horse race in England open to women jockeys with jockey club approval, was run today with 14 lady riders and one man.

The ladies rode the first three horses and included Mrs. Kathleen Welsh of Saskatoon who finished third on Devon Cottage.

The winner was Le Moussallon II, a 10-1 chance ridden by Miss Ann Vaughn. Betty Cooke, on Chancellor was second by four lengths and Mrs. Welch's mount finished another six lengths back. Although Mrs. Welch lives in Canada, she is in England on vacation.

The race dates back to 1668 during the reign of Charles II.

"Friday's running was the 28th and in 200 years the winners have almost always been women. All the riders, men or women, must be amateur jockeys. Another unusual feature is that the entry list is not made up until 15 minutes before post time. The reason for this is understood to be the reputation of women for changing their minds, often and suddenly."

Argonaut Club Orders Shakeup

TORONTO (CP)—Directors of the Argonaut Football Club have ordered a major shake-up in order to make the club a contender for the Big Four championship next season.

The reorganization will see Frank Clair retained as coach of the Double Blue but he won't be general manager. A new man will be "hired or appointed" to take charge of obtaining U. S. players for the team.

Club officials said they would spend all the money necessary to bring in top flight players for next year with the line-up including established stars in professional football.

Clair said Wednesday night he will accept a new contract as coach of the ARGOS. Club officials said they were perfectly happy with Clair but felt the two jobs were too much to demand of one man.

Rocky's Nose Will Determine Next Title Fight

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The next heavyweight championship fight hinges on the condition of Rocky Marciano's nose, manager Al Weill said here Thursday.

"The nose is a little better than it was; it's all right on the outside but the inside has to be cleared up," Weill told reporters upon arrival to confer with Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club.

Weill said Marciano received the nose injury in the seventh round of his fight with Ezzard Charles last June and that if the champion hadn't flattened Charles in the eighth, "there wouldn't have been a ninth because they would have stopped the fight."

"Rocky and myself would like to fight right away," Weill told Norris and Maj. W. H. Peoples, Jr., Miami boxing promoter.

But, he added, a Los Angeles doctor says Marciano can't box for two months.

The champion is keeping in shape with gym work and is "more anxious to fight than anybody else," Weill reported.

Says Athletics' Shift Still Not Decided

WASHINGTON (AP)—Leo De Orsey, who is bidding for the Philadelphia Athletics' franchise, said Thursday he and Rock Mack "have unfinished business dealing with a proposition to keep the Athletics in Philadelphia."

De Orsey said he talked with Mack by telephone Thursday and that what he heard from Roy is "contradictory" to the popular impression that a switch of the Athletics' franchise to Kansas City is all but "in the bag."

Calvin Griffith, executive vice-president of Washington Senators, also conferred with De Orsey Thursday. Neither would say what plans they had in mind to forestall the impending franchise shift.

De Orsey said that "from what Roy told me, it would seem to me the club may remain in Philadelphia."

De Orsey, a lawyer and Joe Tucci, Washington businessman, have offered the Athletics \$2,856,000 for the franchise on the understanding the club would remain in Philadelphia.

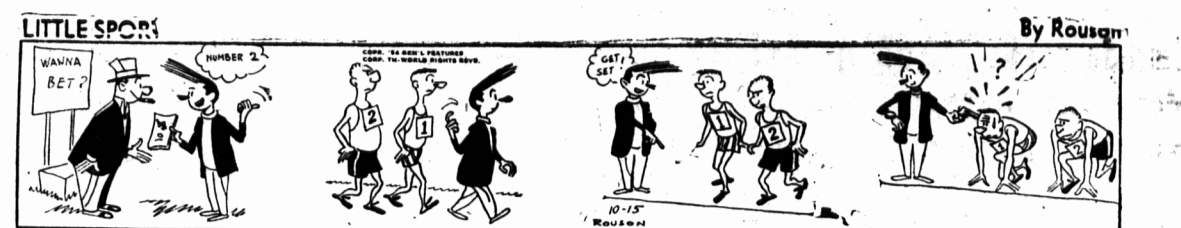
College Tennis Play Saturday

Mayo Smith Named To Manage Phillies In 1955

PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—Philadelphia Phillies Thursday announced appointment of Mayo Smith to succeed Terry Moore as manager of the National League baseball team in 1955.

The 39-year-old Smith, who once played for Toronto Maple Leafs of the International League, was introduced by general manager Roy Hamey at a press conference.

Hamey said Smith was hired because the Phils wanted an "experienced" manager. Smith has managed for six years in minor league ball ranging from class D to AA.

Hamey said Moore was released after a half season with the Phils because he was "inexperienced." His three months as manager followed 11 seasons as a star fielder for St. Louis Cardinals.

NO OTHER REASON

Moore said he had asked Hamey if there were any other reason besides and was told "absolutely none."

Smith was born in New London, Mo., in 1915 and learned to play baseball in Lakewood, Fla. In 1933 he was signed by Dan Howley and went to Toronto. From 1934 to 1936 he played for Wilmington, N. C., of the Piedmont League.

A left-handed hitter, he started out playing third base but switched to the outfield. For seven years he was with Buffalo Bisons and in 1945 played briefly with Philadelphia Athletics. From 1946 to

Vancouver To Have Its Own East-West Game

VANCOUVER (CP)—Vancouver will have its own East-West game come Grey Cup day.

Officials of the British Columbia Athletic Round Table Society announced Tuesday night final details have been completed for holding an East-West Canadian intercollegiate football final, here Nov. 27. It is the same day as the Grey Cup game in Toronto.

The intercollegiate game will match University of British Columbia Thunderbirds against the champions of the eastern intercollegiate league.

A. I. A. Campbell, chairman of BCARTS' publicity committee, said Toronto Varsity Blues and University of Western Ontario Mustangs already have agreed to play here if they win the eastern title.

McGill Redmen and Queen's University are expected to accept shortly.

BCARTS, which is sponsoring the intercollegiate game, is a society formed by a group of sportsmen to promote and encourage athletics in the province.

Probe Gangsters In Horse Racing

CHICAGO, (AP)—Illinois' racing chairman said Thursday investigators have found "some indication of gangster presence" in horse racing in the state.

Paul Serdar, chairman of the board which supervises track operations throughout the state, said his agency has been investigating the situation "all year."

The three-man board will meet soon to "go into the situation thoroughly," he added.

Serdar made the comment in connection with a Chicago daily News story saying "the Capone mob has invaded" horse racing in Illinois.

Mobsters own thoroughbred horses, run them under the names of "stooges" and own stock in race tracks, the story adds.

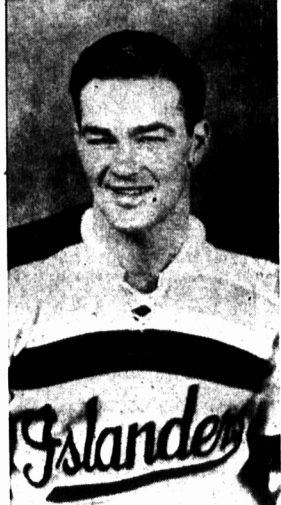

Nfld. Offers Bounty On Lynx

ST. JOHN'S Nfld. (CP)—The Newfoundland government, noting increasing attacks on livestock Thursday announced a bounty on lynx, the first ever imposed in the province.

Resources Minister Rowt said that after Nov. 1, a bounty of \$5 will be paid for each lynx shot in the Codroy valley on the west coast.

Farmers in the area report they have lost hundreds of sheep and Mr. Rowe said the bounty was an alternative to paying for the losses. The bounty will remain in effect for a six-month experimental period and applies only to the Codroy valley.

Motor Corp. Has No Merger Plans

DETROIT, (AP)—George Romney, newly-elected president of American Motors Corp., said Thursday no discussions looking to a merger with Studebaker-Packard Corporation have been held or are contemplated.

Romney, who succeeds the late George W. Mason, told a press conference "the future of American Motors is not tied in with any merger plans."

He said it is counting heavily upon what he termed "product reciprocity," the production and sale of materials to manufacturers in various other lines.

American Motors is the result of a merger last spring of Nash-Kelvinator and Hudson Motors.

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Football Player Dies After Game

MINONG, Wis. (AP)—Harry Koons, 16, a Minong high school football player died Thursday in hospital after an emergency operation following a game Wednesday night.

Koons, after being replaced in the Minong backfield by a substitute, complained of a severe headache and a physician summoned from the stands said the boy apparently had received a concussion.

Found Life In Hungry Drab

SAIZBURG, Austria (AP)—One of the first American athletes to compete behind the Iron Curtain said Thursday he had found life in Hungary "very, very drab with little or no carefree spirit."

Norman Brinker, who competed at the modern pentathlon world championships now taking place in Budapest and is engaged to Wimbledon women's tennis champion Maureen Connolly, made his comment in the U.S. Army's 109th station hospital here.

Brinker suffered a fractured collarbone when he fell from his horse during the first day of the modern pentathlon championships. Despite his injury, he remounted, finished 18th and helped bring the U.S. team into third place in the equestrian phase of the championships.

Boston Red Sox Transfer Players

BOSTON, (AP)—The Boston Red Sox Thursday assigned the contracts of pitchers Tom Herrin and Ben Flowers and infielder Vince Piararo to Louisville Colonels of the American Association.

Herrin and Flowers were with Louisville, a Red Sox farm club, last season and Piararo was with Albany.

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
