2 cups of milk

4 tablespoon cornstarch
Cook until thick, then stir in 2 egg yolks, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Put into a baked pie crust. When filling is cool, top with meringue made by beating egg whites with sugar until stiff enough to form peaks. Place on pie and brown in a slow oven (350 degrees.) about 15 minutes.

"Young wives are killing their husbands by expecting them to do too much work when they get home from their jobs," asserts 78-year-old Mrs. Agnes Ferguson Murdoch.

"And it's all done in the name of co-operation!"

"All this talk you hear these days about co-operation — which really means things like the husband taking over the children as soon as he walks in the door, pitching in on a lot of household, and all the rest of it. Oh, it's all so familiar, as the men know."

THRIVED ON WORK
