Infirmiry Staff, Patients Honor Dr. I. J. Yeo, Retired

The staff of the Provincial Infirmiry recently waited on Dr. I. J. Yeo at his home and presented him with a television lamp and an English-made pipe.

In the address accompanying the presentation the staff recalled Dr. Yeo's many years of "splendid effort" on behalf of the staff and patients at the institution. Dr. Yeo had helped all to overcome their difficulties and his friendly advice directed to the welfare of others would be missed by all concerned.

ADDED COMMENDATION

In a letter forwarded to Dr. Yeo shortly after his retirement as medical attendant at the Infirmiry, Dr. A. J. Murchison, medical superintendent of Riverside Hospital expressed his appreciation for what he termed Dr. Yeo's devotion to the best interests of the patients under his care, and his faithfulness in carrying out the duties of his office.

Prior to his retirement this fall Dr. Yeo had served as medical attendant at the Infirmiry for a period of 11 years. A graduate of McGill (1906),

he practised medicine in Charlottetown for a period of 51 years until retiring from general practice 10 years ago.

FORMER MAYOR

A member of the City Council for 10 years and Mayor of Charlottetown from 1928-30, Dr. Yeo was also president of the Abegweit Amateur Athletic Association, and played a major part in bringing Big Four hockey to the Province.

For 25 years he was president of the company that operated the Charlottetown Forum now known as the Sports Arena.

A vice-principal of West Kent School for several years prior to entering McGill to study medicine, Dr. Yeo on his return to the Province helped organize the 9th Field Ambulance, which he later commanded at Valcartier in the early days of World War One.

While at Valcartier the Charlottetown unit established a field hospital for the 1st Canadian Contingent. Veterans claim that this hospital was the first of its kind ever established in Canada.

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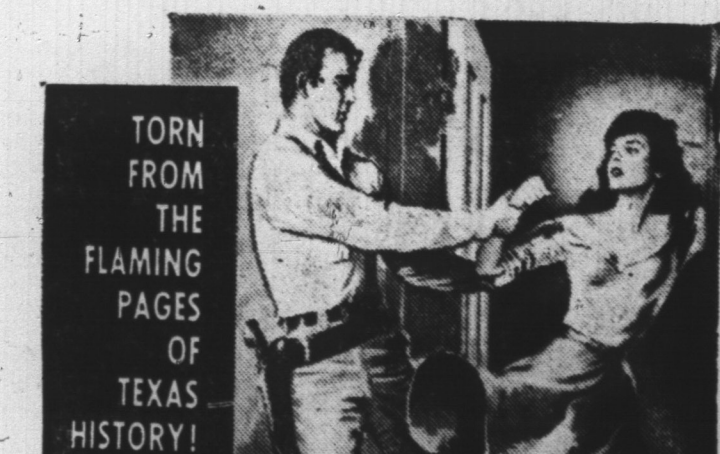

The minister of education, Dr. George Dewar, said that boards of trade are perhaps the most effective force next to the government in aiding industry and economic progress and promoting what is good for the people of the province. Dr. Dewar said that his department is hoping to promote work-while changes in the provincial education system.

HOSPITAL PLAN

"The government will do everything it can to make our hospital plan a success," health minister Hubert MacNeil told the board members. Speaking on behalf of the Summerside Board of Trade, Mr. MacNeil said the Summerside board is very interested in the promotion of new industries in the province.

"One tenth of our population is receiving some assistance from the department of labor and welfare," said department head Henry Wedge. "We must realize that a tremendous amount of money is distributed through the department of welfare and this has a tremendous effect on the economy of the province," said Mr. Wedge.

Provincial treasurer Melvin MacQuaid said: "The time has possibly come in Prince Edward Island when deficit financing will have to be cut down." Mr. MacQuaid said that with interest rates being so high it is a bad time for governments to borrow money.

ROAD POLICY

"We have a province here that is going to develop and go ahead in such a manner that we will be looked on in envy by every other province," highways minister Philip Matheson said. "Roads will have to come early in that development," said Mr. Matheson.

"We propose to give the fishing industry quite a shot in the arm," said Rossier, minister of industry and natural resources. Mr. Rossier pointed out that the Fishermen's Loan Board recently granted loans for the construction of four draggers. "This will mean a lot of fish and a lot of money to the province," he added.

The Premier and his cabinet members were thanked for their part in the program by A. D. Cameron, vice-president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade. Chairman of the meeting was board president Captain C. R. Hunter.

If representatives of the truckers and railway could meet informally some of the differences regarding ferry transportation could be ironed out.

FERRY SERVICE

Throughout the entire day's proceedings the vital need for improved ferry service at Borden threaded its way with a companion plea for a better freight rate structure that would recognize the economic inequities of this province.

The Island brief's emphatic statement that "our basic and first need is for a new car ferry" was coupled with an equally emphatic plea to the Commission to find some alternative to the policy of horizontal freight rate increases.

Speaking for the Charlottetown Board of Trade, Capt. C. R. Hunter forcibly urged the necessity of another ice-breaking railway ferry on the Borden route. Pressure for such a ferry did not detract in any way, he said, from appreciation for the equally necessary vehicle ferry "for which we understand tenders have been called."

CAUSEWAY

Captain Hunter added that the acquisition of both ferries would not detract in the least "from the overall objective of all islanders for the proposed causeway."

Too close a link between the ferry service and railway train schedules was noted by Keith MacKinnon in a brief presented for the Canadian Trucking Association. He said the ferry service is regarded by the railway administration as a part of the railway service rather than as a transportation service to the people of the province.
