LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY

City of Galveston Completely Wrecked.

OTHER TOWNS MORE OR LESS DEMOLISHED.

The Loss of Life at Galveston Estimated at 2,600.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 10.—The West Indian storm, which reached the Gulf coast yesterday morning, wrought awful havoc.

In the last report the news is conflicting. But it is known that an appalling disaster has befallen the city of Galveston, where it is reported a thousand or more lives have been blotted out and tremendous property damages have been incurred.

The estimate made by the citizens of Galveston was that four thousand houses, most of them residences, had been destroyed and that at least one thousand people had been drowned, killed or are missing.

The city is a complete wreck. Most of the sailing crafts were wrecked. They were either piled upon the wharves or are floating, bottom side up, in the bay.

There is a small steamer ashore three miles north of Pelican Island. But your correspondent cannot distinguish her name. She was flying the British flag.

Another big vessel has been driven ashore at Virginia Point, and still another is aground at Texas City.

At Houston Point, off Houston Island, an unknown ship lies in a helpless condition.

The city is in darkness, the electric plant having been ruined.

There is no way of estimating the property damage at present.

The eastern portion of the city, which is the residence district, is practically wiped out of existence. On the west end, which faces the gulf, and on another portion of the island much havoc is done.

The beach has been swept clean. Bath houses are destroyed, and many of the residences there are total wrecks.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 10.—The following telegram has just been received from Houston by the News of this city:—"A relief train has just returned. They could not get closer than 6 miles of Virginia Point, where the prairie is covered with lumber, debris, trunks and dead bodies.

Two hundred corpses were counted from the trains.

Nothing can be seen of Galveston. The bodies were picked up. The estimated loss of life up to the time the train left is about 2,000.

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 11.—Meagre reports are arriving here from the country between Houston and Galveston along the line of the Santa Fe railway. The tornado was the most destructive in the history of the state.

The town of Alvin is reported to be practically demolished.

Hitchcock has suffered severely from the storm, while the little town of Alta Loma is reported without a house standing.

L. B. Carlton, of Alvin, reports that not a building is left standing in the town, either residence or business.

Stocks of goods and house furniture are ruined and the crops are a total loss.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept. 10.—A special despatch from New Orleans states that a message was received on Saturday evening fixing the loss of life at Galveston at 2,600. The message came by cable from Vera Cruz.
