He said he was asked for advice and got some details which I want to pass on to you. First of all, according to Dave, people in the companies in Canada that do work for the Department of Defence Production are anxious to move here. This is in case there's a war their whole factory couldn't be knocked out at once. Well, Sir, it seems like there are a number of them would like to come to Charlottetown, they've heard much good reports about the work that is going on out at the airport where planes are being repaired. But on top of this, and I like this a lot, they say they think they could give some work to the old Charlottetown companies that are already there. All they've got to find out about is the people.
