Rotarians Hear Champion Debaters

Members of the Charlottetown Rotary Club and guests present yesterday were charmed with the natural oratorical ability, logical presentation of arguments, and straight forward sincerity of Alan MacDonald and Walter Reid, the two clever students who recently won the Canadian University Debating Championships for their Alma Mater, St. Dunstan's University.

The boys were introduced by Dr. Frank MacKinnon of Prince of Wales College, and he expressed the regret of the Rotary Club that Rev. Father Cass and Mr. O'Grady, who tutored the boys were unable to be present. The boys gave practically verbatim the speeches which won the championship for them on the negative side of the question, "Resolved that there should be a Canadian Bill of Rights."

Alan MacDonald was the first speaker. He told of how he and Walter Reid talked among themselves for three weeks as to which side of the question they should take and finally decided they were against the Resolution. The gist of his portion of the talk was that at the time of Confederation the Provinces were given the exclusive jurisdiction in the field of civil liberties. Today certain factions are trying to deprive the Provinces of this right and to centralize authority but he claimed that human rights never change, they are the same now as at the time of Confederation, and that the Fathers of Confederation recognized this principle, and tried to make sure that basic rights always would be protected.

The four basic freedoms, he emphasized, are rooted in law, both ancient and modern, some of these cannot be legislated in the modern sense but have been accepted and recognized over the long years of history. The individual citizen has rights and responsibilities which he must respect. There are two ways to preserve human rights. The British way of common law for centuries has been engraved in the hearts and traditions of our people and has been eminently successful. The American way is good also but in some respects is tied up too much in statutory documents. The danger apparently is, in a Bill of Rights a minority could enforce their views, and we might lose our ties of tradition, jurisprudence, ways of life, and our strong ties of Empire.

Walter Reid then followed with a continuation of the arguments and said he felt the Bill of Rights must be opposed because of the strong support given it from what he believed were subversive sources. These want to spread unrest, unbridled license, and then assume the role of martyrs. Clear and deliberate thinking is needed on the part of the Canadian people to recognize their gilded slogans. There are men in dark alleys of thought who say that freedom can only be legislated. We must beware. We are not isolated individuals and an attitude of sympathy and understanding must guide all our social acts.

The boys were very ably thanked by co-chairman Frank Jelkes. Rotarian Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan thanked the Rotary Club for a check of \$4,500, handed to him by the Secretary for the Red Cross Crippled Children's Work. Rotarian Frank Curtis also thanked the Club for their contribution to the Charlottetown Arts and Crafts Guild. Guests present were Rotarians Ben Taylor, President Summerside Club, Edward Foley and Lorne MacFarlane, members of the Summerside Rotary Club, P. A. Murnaghan, Deputy Minister Department of Industry and Natural Resources, Allan MacDonald, father of Alan MacDonald, the Debating Team, and Jerome O'Brien, manager Island Co-operative Services.

Saddler Knocked Down But Wins By TKO Verdict

BOSTON, March 17 —(AP)—World featherweight champion Sandy Saddler of New York was knocked off his feet for the first time in his 143 fights tonight but came back with a furious attack to floor Irish Tommy Collins of Boston four times before winning a technical knockout verdict in the fifth round of a St. Patrick's night donny-brook.

Saddler weighed 130 3-4, a quarter pound more than Collins for the scheduled 10-round non-title bout. Referee Joe Zupatas stepped in to stop the wild action at 2:20 of the fifth round. Collins, a confident 23-year-old, stunned the champion with a two-fisted attack and then dropped him with a solid left about halfway through the first round. Saddler took the required count of eight. Saddler put Collins down in the second round as the Bostonian landed on the lower rope and hit the ring apron after a punch and half push.

Two Rangers Out With Injuries

NEW YORK, March 17 —(CP)—New York Rangers announced today that two defencemen, rookie Hy Buller and Steve Kraftcheck, are out of the game for the rest of the National Hockey League season because of injuries suffered in last night's game with Toronto Maple Leafs.

The Montreal-born Buller, who came to the Rangers from Cleveland of the American Hockey League, was struck by a puck in the game which the Leafs won 4-2. He suffered a fracture of a small bone in the left foot. Kraftcheck, who once played for Hamilton, Ont., suffered a strained ankle.

The loss of Buller and Kraftcheck leaves Rangers with only four defencemen for their effort at catching Boston Bruins for the fourth and last N.H.L. playoff spot.

PARIS, March 17 —(AP)—Laurant Dauthuille, a leading French middleweight, tonight hammered out a 10-round decision over Norman Hayes of Boston. Dauthuille weighed 159 pounds, Hayes at 161 1/2.

Neither fighter showed much. McFater, Toronto's hope in the lightweight division, missed repeatedly with round-house rights and lefts and Shade didn't have enough zing in his punches to shake the 21-year-old.

In the semi-final, Gordon Wallace of Brantford, Ont., pounded out an eight-round decision over Billy Piffled, Toronto. Wallace weighed 186 1/2 and Piffled 168.
