# EXTRAORDINARY CORRESPONDENCE.

Government Compromising—Eighty-five Cents on the Dollar.

EXTENDED comment upon the correspondence appended hereto is not necessary. Every intelligent and honest man who reads it must come to the conclusion that Premier Farquharson ought to be dismissed the public service—and that quickly. His letter in reply to Mr. Stewart's request for payment in full is the most illogical and altogether extraordinary production of a Premier that we ever read or heard of. He says: "We did not owe you anything." Yet he paid 85 per cent. of the amount—"some hundreds of dollars." Then he pleads: "If you did not receive 100 per cent. you received 85 per cent.," and then he caps the climax by declaring that he did "not want a brick to go into that building that was not paid for"—though he had paid for only 85 per cent.

Has it come to this—that Prince Edward Island is already committed to the Premier Farquharson merely making the Province appear to be dishonest and ridiculous?

SOUTHPORT, Nov. 22, 1900.

DEAR SIR,—I received 85 per cent. of the amount of my bill for material applied to the Asylum. You paid Mr. Nicholson in full with interest. You also say you offered to pay Mr. Lowe in full with interest. I think I should receive the full amount of my bill, without interest at least, seeing that I was "as great a loss as either of these men."

PREMIER'S OFFICE, CH'TOWN, Nov. 22nd, 1900.

DEAR SIR,—I received yours of yesterday. You complain that we paid you 85 per cent. of the bill due you. You were told at the time you received the money that it was a voluntary matter on the part of the Government—that we did not owe you anything. We took the money that belonged to ourselves, as a Government, and paid it out; and if you did not receive 100 per cent, you received 85 per cent. You got that money—some hundreds of dollars now you complain because we paid you. You say Mr. Lowe was paid in full—Mr. Lowe got nothing. Mr. Nicholson got paid in full, as you say, but his was a loan in money to enable the con-

tractors to go on with the work. Yours was material, a different matter altogether. We are out every dollar that Mr. Lowe owed us. Instead of the Government receiving the money due, we paid him and could not get it back, losing it all for the purpose of paying you. Amongst the members of the Government I stood alone in this matter. They said "why should we pay away money which belongs to us and give it to these other people?" My answer was that I did not want a brick to go into that building that was not paid for—hence you got the money.

Hon. D. Farquharson:

DEAR SIR,—Your reply to my note of a recent date received. I must say that I was never told that the payment which I received "was voluntary on the part of the Government—that they did not owe me anything."

Now, I was under the impression that the material which I supplied was in the possession of the Government, and that as an honest Government they would pay for it.

You say Mr. Lowe never received anything. I never thought he did; that according to your interview published in the Guardian of November 27, 1899, the Government offered to settle with Mr. Lowe and pay him for the material at full invoice prices, also to pay truckage for placing it there, and interest for the time the material remained on the ground.

Seeing that the Government were good enough to make Mr. Lowe this offer, why do they withhold 15 per cent. from me?

You say you stood out against your colleagues when they wished to keep the money, saying that you did not want a brick to go into that building unpaid for. Still I am unpaid for 15 per cent.

However, I am not ungrateful for any favors which I may have received at your hands, and am glad to know that honesty is not entirely absent from the Government.

# MR. PATON AND THE PREMIER.

SOME persons have wondered why THE EXAMINER has not replied to the Patriot's scurrilous attack upon Mr. James Paton. Our answer is (1) that the attack was not worth noticing, (2) that having farmers' meetings and other important matters to attend to we hadn't time to notice it, (3) that Mr. Paton doesn't need any defence.

Good wine needs no bush; and a man such as Mr. Paton does not require much to be said on his behalf. Everyone knows Mr. Paton for a thrifty, canny Scotsman, who has achieved success as a man of business, and at the same time taken an active interest in the welfare of the community in which his interest is bound up; and every one knows that just such men as he are most of all needed in the public service of this Province at the present juncture.

As to temperance and prohibition, it is really wonderful that The Patriot should have challenged comparisons between the conduct of Mr. Paton and that of Premier Farquharson. Who can say that Mr. Paton has ever been, in the slightest degree, inconsistent in that regard; and who can say that Premier Farquharson has not acted the hypocrite and traitor? Premier Farquharson pretended to be a great prohibitionist, but, when brought to the ring-bolt by his party, and compelled to choose between his temperance friends and those who desired a license law for Charlottetown, he chose the latter, and pocketed the "blood-money" as coolly as any liquor dealer in the city. Then finding that public opinion denounced his conduct, he had a Provincial Prohibition law passed to please the temperance men, taking care that it would not come into operation for upwards of a year and that the clubs should not be included, thus doing the prevention of drunkenness. Premier Farquharson's conduct in respect to temperance and prohibition and the liquor traffic has disgusted prohibitionists, liquor dealers and moderate drinkers alike. The people ask themselves, how can a man who has acted as he has acted in this regard be trusted with any public business of importance? A deceiver in respect to anything, he must prove a deceiver in respect to other things—if only his party should put the screws upon him.

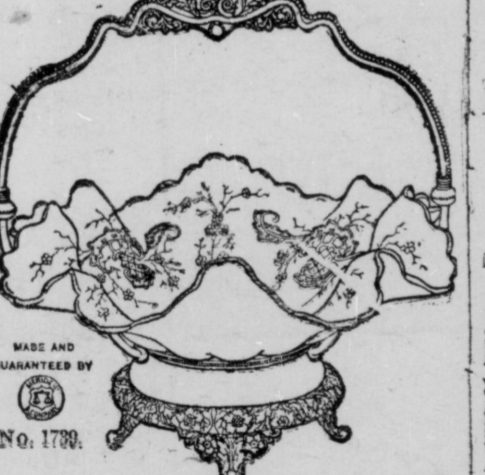

# UNFULFILLED PROMISES.

A Liberal Farmer Scores the Government.

SIR,—As we are now on the verge of a general election it may not be amiss to review briefly some of the promises made by the Liberal party on previous occasions, also some of their acts.

In the year 1893 the chief question brought forward was that of taxation. Mr. Peters declared that owing to the probability of our having our claims at Ottawa adjusted taxation was away in the dim and distant future—indeed we would, in all probability, never require to levy taxes at all. He also declared that in the event of his party having the Government he would consult the people before levying taxes. His party was elected, and a few months after he and a lot of his boon companions went to Mount Stewart and told the people that he was going to tax them.

In 1897 the question was again that of revenue. This time the bait was held out in a different form. He had the assurance of a favorable consideration of our claims and we were to have an arbitration with the Ottawa Government concerning them and taxation was to be swept away forever. It is well known to all that Mr. Peters was on this cry, and immediately started for British Columbia! Thus ended the great arbitration scheme.

Mr. Warburton now assumed the Government. His career was uneventful, the only marks left being the withholding of the grants to exhibitions, the withdrawal of the supplements from the teachers and the opening of a road to his own land.

Mr. Warburton reached the desired haven, and Mr. Farquharson assumed the reins. Mr. Farquharson holds out the same old bait and he will get as much as his predecessors; for Sir Richard Cartright has declared that there cannot be any further increase of provincial subsidies and that Ontario must cease to be the milk cow of the Dominion.

Now let us look at a few of the acts of the present party as led by Premier Farquharson. They admit that they threw away \$1500 of the Province's money in the grant which they knew well would expose their incapacity. We are taxed, the public works are falling to ruin, and still we are going into debt. The money goes everywhere.
