Don't put the cattle in the stables too early in the fall. Let them stay out in the cold pastures to make them hardy to stand the winter.

Don't give the pigs any grain on the grass in the summer. They might grow fat, and then you would be tempted to sell them in the fall, and by so doing you would miss many of the concerns during the winter, when they might be pleading for even a turn ramp to keep them warm.

Don't take any pains to have a good article of produce to sell. It is fit good enough for you, it ought to be good enough for others that are no better by nature than you are.

Don't take any pains to find out how much it costs to produce a pound of beef, a pound of pork, a bushel of wheat, oats or potatoes.

Don't tell those two or three extra horses, unless you get as much for them as your neighbors got a few years ago.

Don't attend any agricultural meetings or discuss agricultural questions. It's childish. But go to all the political and other meetings and talk as heartily as you can.

Don't give the boys any pecuniary interest in the farm or stock; it might make them feeble, big if they had pocket-money of their own, they might spend it foolishly in the purchase of a jack-knife or a razor.

Don't buy the women any of the many labor-saving devices, let them rub and scrub away "and sew as long as their eyes can see," and knit after they get blind, you know they can't do it if they are good knitters.

Don't take any pains to pay up your bills in the fall, if you have been fortunate as to be able to deal on credit. Get the merchant to carry over your account till next fall.

The memoirs of Sir John Macdonald, by Joseph Pope, just published, contain the record of a little transaction by the Wiman, which will not add to that gentleman's reputation for either honor or acuteness.

In 1884, when Wiman was hand in hand with Sir Richard Cartwright, Edward Blake and other leaders of the liberal party in Canada, the distinguished apostle of commercial union wrote a letter to Sir John Macdonald, conveying the startling intimation that a party plot was on foot to wrest Manitoba from the British crown by an armed insurrection, and among the promoters of this nefarious scheme were Blake, then leader of the Opposition, and Sir Richard Cartwright, his first lieutenant.

To this Sir John Macdonald replied, writing from Riverview in Loup, September 11, 1884, as follows: "MY DEAR MR. WIMAN—Thanks for yours of the 6th inst. I can quite understand your mode of action. He goes to Winnipeg and exaggerates the state of feeling in Manitoba. Now, the gentleman he sees receive him politely and say they will be very glad if Canada can be induced to join the union. With this statement he proceeds to Winnipeg, and pursues the same course of exaggeration. I don't believe a word of his statement about Mr. Blake and Sir Richard Cartwright. The latter has expressed his belief in the future independence of Canada; but that is all. Neither of them would countenance for a moment anything like a rising in arms. I shall look forward with interest to your proceeds to Winnipeg, after visiting Washington. I shall be at Ottawa after this week. I need only say how much obliged to you I am for the interesting talk in this matter."

It is recorded that Sir John detailed that letter with perfect gravity, and that he then smiled grimly and said: "This is a new role for one who asked Sir John Cartwright." Mr. Pope's account of what motive Wiman could have in writing such rubbish. "Oh," replied Sir John, "he wants to ingratiate himself with me, and he thinks this statement, with which he has been stuffed, will be acceptable to me, because it reflects upon my opponents."

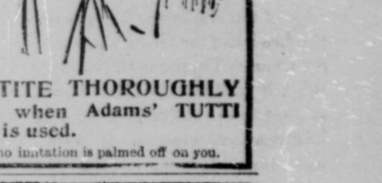
