## N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP) — The year 1954 saw the greatest stock market boom in the history of the United States.

Old records going back to 1929 fell one by one as the market marched steadily forward all year. People made more dollars in the 1954 stock market than ever before. The general public was in the market. They almost all made money. A few lost.

The value of listed securities on the New York stock exchange went from about \$117,000,000,000 at the start of the year to an estimated \$170,000,000,000 on New Year's Eve. A total profit of around \$53,000,000,000.

The story was much the same for the American stock exchange in New York, the Midwest stock exchange in Chicago, and all the other smaller exchanges.

**SEPTEMBER START**  
This present great bull market boom got going in the middle of September in 1953 after a nine-month decline. It dipped under profit-taking at the end of 1953, but recovered and kept right on surging ahead into 1954.

In the final week of the year, the stock market went through a typical performance. Monday it was lower under the pressure of selling for tax purposes and because of the uncertainties surrounding the vote of confidence on the French government of Premier Mendes-France.

The market snapped out of that reaction and pounded ahead strongly Tuesday and Wednesday. It was quiet Thursday.

On the final day of the year the advance was resumed.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed the year at \$155.20, up 60 cents on the day, and only \$2.50 from the all-time peak.

**GAIN FOR YEAR**  
The gain for the year was \$47.10, or 43.6 per cent. The next best year was 1928 when the average was up 40.1 per cent. In 1929 the average from the first of the year to the all-time high on Sept. 3 ad-

vanced 34.4 per cent. For the entire year of 1929, of course, the average dropped 13.5 per cent.

In the total number of shares traded, however, 1954 was only the seventh greatest year with 573,374,622 shares changing hands. It is the best since 1933 when 654,816,000 shares traded. In the record year of 1929, the total was 1,124,800,000 shares.

The year 1954 marked a change in the nature of trading. There was no doubt that the general public came into the market in large numbers. At the same time, the great institutions bid against each other for the blue chip stocks and for the "pale blue" chips as well. All of that helped to boost prices.

**Trial Runs Soon For Atomic Sub**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The navy said Thursday it now expects to have the atomic submarine Nautilus ready for trial runs about March 1.

Testing of the world's first nuclear engine submersible, which was launched in January, originally was scheduled for last October but an error in installation of steam piping scrapped that plan.

**Bank Shareholders Approve Merger**

TORONTO (CP) — Shareholders of the Dominion Bank Wednesday approved the proposal for amalgamation with the Bank of Toronto following similar action Tuesday by shareholders of the Bank of Toronto.

Only approval by the governor-in-council now is needed, and four weeks notice of application for permission to amalgamate must first be given.

Robert Rae, Dominion Bank president, addressing Wednesday's annual meeting, said the earliest date at which the amalgamation could become effective is about Feb. 1. The new institution will be known as the Toronto-Dominion Bank.

Authorized capital of the new bank will be \$30,000,000 and issued capital \$15,000,000. Of the 1,500,000 shares par value \$10 each, 700,000 shares would go to Dominion Bank shareholders and 800,000 to Bank of Toronto shareholders.

Division of the issued capital was in proportion to the capital and real accounts of the two banks—\$21,000,000 in the case of Dominion and \$24,000,000 in the case of Toronto.
