### IMPROVED METHODS NEEDED.

The St. John Telegraph points out that the trade of Canada must, of necessity, suffer as a result of the application of the Dingley tariff in the United States. It says that "the intention of the measure is to injure Canada as much as possible, by putting a stop to the export of Canadian goods to the United States, but just how far this design will be realized remains to be seen." Continuing, it refers particularly to the prohibitory lumber duties, expresses the hope that the increased demand in the United States for home-grown lumber consequent upon those duties will eventually relieve Canadians of the competition of American deals in the British markets, and adds,—

"In the meantime it will be wise for our people to direct their attention to other markets for our products. So far we have been exporting rough lumber almost entirely, but there is no reason why this condition of affairs should always continue. The rough lumber which we exported is worked up into other forms, and finished products of various kinds, many of which could be made here quite as well as on the other side of the Atlantic. This is a subject which, we have no doubt, has already attracted the attention of our exporters, and which will become more urgent now that one important market is virtually closed against us. We have become accustomed to one set of business conditions, and naturally look upon them as necessary to our prosperity; but it by no means follows that other conditions which will be created under stress of new circumstances will not injure quite as much to our advantage as those upon which we have become accustomed to rely."

These remarks are fully in accord with the national policy and national spirit of Canadians. We are not to be put down. We shall rather improve our products as a result of the application of the Dingley tariff, and we shall seek other markets for them. The Telegraph's remarks concerning lumber products apply with equal force to agricultural products. These must be "worked up" to suit the Home, the British and the European markets; and we must have better facilities for moving them at less cost. By the way, when shall we see an ocean steamer calling regularly at Charlottetown and taking goods out of cold storage, as well as out of the ordinary warehouses, for sale in the British markets.

### RAILWAYS IN AFRICA.

The Empire, of London, remarks that there are three lines being hurried on in Africa under British control which are destined probably to play the most important part in the opening up of the continent and in the consolidation of British interests. One is the strategic line down the Nile Valley, the other is the cross line to Uganda, and the third the extension from Cape Town to Bulawayo. The last has made the most progress and will bear the most speedy results. It will cross the Zambesi on some wonderful work of the engineers probably before the cross line reaches Uganda. About 60 miles of the Uganda line have been completed at an outlay of some £400,000, while from Cape Town there are 1,190 miles of railway already completed to Palapye.

### THE MINISTERIAL MISSION.

We are told that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at the conference of Premiers, in London, urged the denunciation of the German and Belgian treaties, which obstructed preferential trade with England, that the other Premiers supported him; and that "with regard to this Mr. Chamberlain did not indicate the British Government's course, but the impression prevailed that the treaties would not be denounced." If this should be the result of Sir Wilfrid's efforts and Sir Louis' able speech and personal advocacy, the products of Belgium, Germany and all other countries under the most favored nations clause, will continue to be entitled to preferential admission at Canadian ports, and Great Britain will have no preference whatever. The truth of Sir Charles Tupper's statement in this regard will thus be vindicated. It is pretty clear that the mission to Great Britain of Sir Wilfrid and Sir Louis will result in nothing but a big bill of costs. This would have been avoided had the Government taken The Examiner's advice and simply lowered the duties on those special classes of goods which we import from Great Britain; and Great Britain would have enjoyed a substantial advantage in Canadian markets. But the other way was calculated to raise questions, and make a talk, and promote the popularity of Sir Wilfrid and Sir Louis among the English people, and end in nothing, — and so it was adopted.

### MR. REID IMPRESSED

He Thinks the World Knows England Better Since the Jubilee.  
The correspondent of the Associated Press had an interview with Mr. Whitelaw Reid, who has been in London representing President McKinley at the jubilee celebration. Mr. Reid said: "What most impressed me in regard to the jubilee was the manifest and profound devotion of the English people to their Queen. And after that I was most impressed by their obvious and strong desire to be on good terms with the United States. 'I think the world knows England better since the jubilee, and that England also knows herself better. The more men have considered it the more have they realized what a tremendous gain for civilization and for mankind has been this enormous expansion during the Victorian era.' 'Nothing could exceed the consideration and cordiality that have been shown me here in every way. I know, of course, that this has been intended wholly for the President and people of the United States, whom I have had the honor to represent; and it will be my first duty on my return home to report fully concerning it to President McKinley and Secretary Sherman.'"

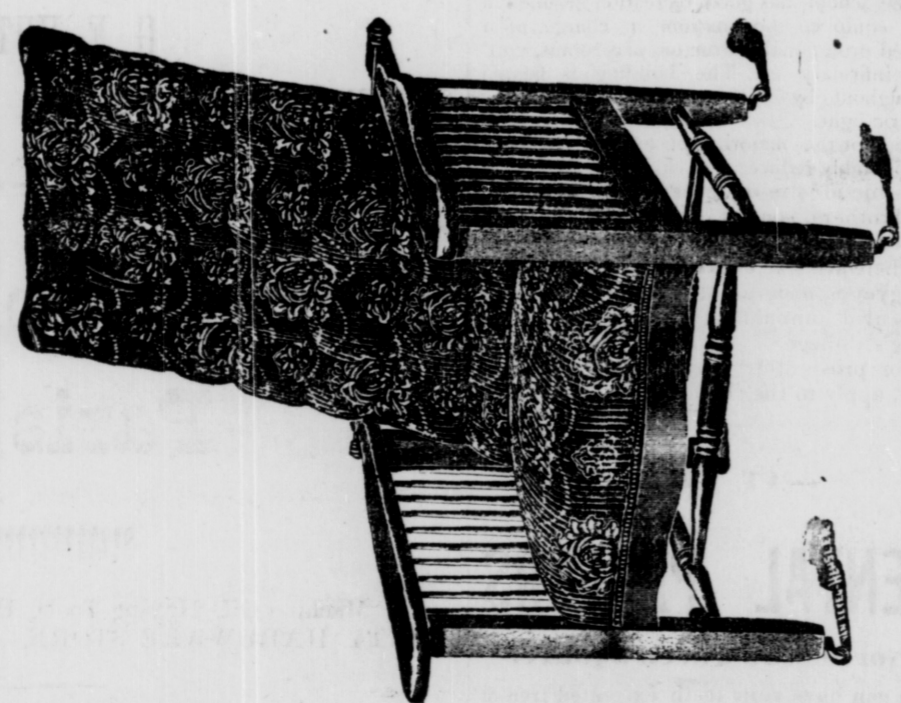

The Manchester ship canal is making slow progress as a commercial venture and the result is not encouraging to those who are contemplating similar undertakings. During the half year just ended there was a perceptible diminution in the number of ships, though there is a slight increase in the aggregate tonnage. In the coasting trade even the tonnage shows a falling off, but in the foreign trade the tonnage increased 5 per cent, and the revenue 20 per cent. The difference is accounted for by the fact that the tolls are charged on cargo and not on tonnage. The business done, therefore, shows a considerable advance, but the revenue is still far from enough to meet the expenditure. All that the most favorable critic can say is that the undertaking "is being conducted at a smaller loss than last year" — not a very encouraging verdict for the shareholders.

### ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

The talk about exorbitant prices for everything in the Klondyke is greatly exaggerated. Ice is cheaper there than it is in Boston.

Montreal Gazette: The arrival of the Renown to serve as the flagship of the North American squadron is a further step in a process that has been going on for some time, strengthening the fleet on this station. Up to a few years ago the flagship was usually a second-class vessel compared with the best. The arrival of the Blake, a cruiser of the first class, marked the beginning of the change. The Blake was followed by the Crescent, another high-class ship, the fleet being also strengthened by the Talbot cruiser. The Renown exceeds the Crescent as the Crescent exceeds the Northampton, and as the fleet of to-day exceeds that of twelve or fifteen years ago.
