### PROHIBITION IN MANITOBA.

THE measure of prohibition before the Legislature of Manitoba will come into force on June 1, 1901. It makes provision for the closing of all places where liquor is sold, both in bulk or by the glass with the exception of drug stores, which are permitted to sell under very stringent regulations, chiefly under orders of a physician and for illness only. Any person caught infringing the act will be subject to a fine of not less than \$200 and not more than \$1000 for the first offence, and imprisonment of not less than three months with hard labor, without the option of a fine, for the second breach. The wholesalers and manufacturers will not be materially affected, as they are protected by the Dominion laws of trade and commerce, but so far as the province is concerned, they will not derive one cent of revenue except from liquor allowed to drug stores. Under the act they are prohibited from making sales of any kind in the province except in the instances stated, but will still have the power to import or to manufacture for the trade outside the province. They will, however, be prohibited from giving free drinks or dispensing liquor by the bottle or flask to their friends. Another feature of the act will be that no man can import liquor by the bottle, flask, cask or any other way than for his own use. For the enforcement of these regulations provision is made by way of giving the inspector full power of search, etc., and ample rewards for convictions.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that various doubtful motives are being assigned for the apparently intentional protraction of the session of Parliament. They all probably do the Government injustice. There is nothing deliberate about the Government's inaction; it is just its way.

### THE NEW TAXES.

By the bill now before the Legislature it is provided that taxes shall in future be levied as follows:—

1. Upon all companies accepting risks and carrying on business of insurance against fire in the Province whose principal office or organization is not within the Province, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars each.

2. Upon all companies accepting risks and carrying on the business of insurance against fire in the Province whose principal office or organization is within the Province the sum of seventy-five dollars each.

3. Upon all Insurance Companies and Associations of any kind having agencies or accepting risks upon the lives of persons within the Province and transacting the business of life or endowment insurance therein as the sole object of their organization, whose principal office or organization is not within the Province; the sum of two hundred and twenty-five dollars each.

4. Upon all companies doing the business of accident and guarantee insurance within the province, the sum of fifty dollars each.

5. Upon all companies doing the business of Marine Insurance within the Province the sum of one hundred dollars each.

6. Upon all companies doing the business of trust or loan or building companies or associations within the province the sum of two hundred and twenty-five dollars each.

7. Upon every telegraph or other company working a telegraph line for the use of the public within the Province the sum of three hundred and seventy-five dollars.

8. Upon all banks doing business in this Province whose head office is in this province, the sum of one hundred dollars each, if such bank has not more than one office or place of business within the province.

9. Upon all banks doing business in this Province, whether their organization and head office is within this Province or not, the sum of two hundred dollars, if such bank has two or more offices or places of business within this Province.

10. Upon all companies doing business within this province manufacturing and supplying gas or electricity for lighting, heating or motive purposes the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars each.

11. Upon all companies carrying on the business of common carriers for the transportation of freight and passengers by means of steamships whose head office or organization is within this province, the sum of one hundred dollars each, and upon the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company Limited the sum of two hundred dollars.

12. Upon all express companies doing business within this province whose principal office or organization is not within the province, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars.

13. Upon every company, firm or person carrying on the business of brewing or distilling within the province the sum of five hundred dollars each.

These taxes are to be paid semi-annually, on the 1st June and 1st December, and at once become Crown debts recoverable without trial by jury. The local managers and agents of companies doing business in this Province are made personally liable for the payment of the taxes.

### THE PINEAU DOCUMENT.

SIR,—The wave of political corruption and rascality that is sweeping over our fair country is enough to bring the blush of shame to anybody with a spark of patriotism left, and to cause those affected with pessimism to throw up their hands and cry, "All is lost."

The affidavits read before our Legislature unfortunately smirch the character of a member of the medical profession—a profession that we have been wont to look upon as containing only men of honor, and of whom, in our extremity, we are glad to trust that most precious gifts, our very life itself. It is a pity that the man in question, who I understand is a young man, should have found his name associated with such ignoble work. It is a pity, too, that the people who look for honesty in politics, as in all things, can no longer associate political vandalism with those who are publicly known to be of the criminal classes. Although the evidence is strong against him, we have yet hopes that Dr. Wickham may be able to enter a successful disclaimer and thus relieve himself and the profession to which he belongs of the stigma that has been cast upon them.
