

Local and Other Items.

REMEMBER that Rev. R. B. McDonald lectures this evening in St. Patrick's Hall.

THE British have received friendly communications from most of the Cabul and Ghilzai Chiefs.

SILK has been manufactured in Canada. The first piece, from D. & A. Corriveau's factory was shown some days ago in Montreal.

A DISPATCH of the 13th from Madrid reports that seventy-five fishermen were drowned during a gale off the coast of Portugal.

It is a sign of the hard money times, that the November pay-roll of the Wason Manufacturing Company, at Springfield Mass., amounting to nearly \$16,000, was paid entirely in gold and silver.

YESTERDAY a man went to collect a balance of \$3, and was tendered with \$2 in the copper cents—issued by the Local Government at a discount of 10 per cent. He went home carrying heavy weights in his overcoat pockets.

THE Allen mail steamer *Sarmatia* from Liverpool arrived at Halifax on the 12th. She brought 119 bags mail, 5.0 tons freight for Halifax, and 1,200 tons through freight and 50 passengers—30 steerage, 4 intermediate and 16 cabin.

THE Encyclical letter of the Pope appeals to the Governments to restore to the Church the degree of liberty which would enable her to efficaciously employ her influence in favor of society. The *Italia* says the Encyclical letter is the commencement of a crusade against modern institutions.

MARY DORKHAM and Peter McAdam were the only appearances at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. Mary was very disorderly before and after arrest, as was Peter also. She displayed a well blacked eye as did Peter. They were both fined \$1 each and costs or four days.

It is not yet known what will be done regarding the "Shediac Mystery." The Westmorland Circuit Court will meet shortly, and some disposal of them will doubtless be made. Annie Parker, who, with Mrs. Osborne and Harry, was remanded to jail, has lately been allowed the liberty of going out for a walk.

PROFESSOR ANDERSON seldom favors us with a lecture; but when he does so, he always gives us a good one. His lecture upon "Hamlet," which he delivered in Y. M. C. A. Hall last evening—is an exhaustive analysis of the Bard of Avon's finest character; and we have no doubt that the select audience present duly appreciated it. At all events it was repeatedly applauded; and, at the close, the learned lecturer received a hearty vote of thanks.

At Dorchester, N. B., on the 13th inst., Elizabeth Burk, whom the Jury found guilty of an attempt to poison her husband, and recommended to mercy, was sentenced to imprisonment in the common goal for a period of one month. His Honor taking into consideration her illness and the five months she has already spent in goal. The Moncton "Times" says, she seemed greatly delighted at getting off so easily.

THE Cape Breton Board of Trade, says the "Monetary Times," are not dormant by any means. They are now to the front with a petition to the Governor-in-Council praying for an appropriation towards establishing a weekly line of steamers between Cape Breton, P. E. Island, other maritime ports and the lake cities, which, they claim, will not only encourage inter-provincial trade, but materially decrease the price of coal in Ontario.

NOTWITHSTANDING the mildness of the weather, there have been more sickness in the city this winter than we have known for many years. Yesterday—Court day—the Chief Justice was confined to his room, and his associate, Judge Hensley, was also unwell. Judge Reddin of the King's County Court, is on the "unwell" list. The coughing on the streets, in our churches, in our shops, and places of public resort, is almost general.

A destructive hurricane passed over Bermuda on the 27th ult. The steamer *Alpha*, which arrived at Halifax from Bordeaux Bar, France, and foundered. All hands perished. The *Ganahida* was a bark of 700 tons, owned by Jas. W. Carmichael & Co., of New Glasgow, and was on a voyage from Baltimore to Bordeaux, France. Four young men belonging to Pictou, the captain Wm. Grant, two young men, sons of Jas. Meikle, baker, and one son of Mr. Anderson, were lost with the wrecked vessel.

EVERYONE now admits that the Liberal-Conservative Government is the economical Government. But there is a point beyond which economy ceases to be a virtue. When persons who go to get their letters are, night after night, left to stand blowing their fingers and stamping their feet in the freezing atmosphere of the halls and corridors of the Post Office, economy degenerates into meanness. For the benefit of the suffering crowds who, nightly, through the Post Office corridors, we suggest to the active and genial keeper of the Post Office building the propriety of letting on a little more steam!

American Presbyterians are troubled regarding a question of doctrine. The premillennial belief that Christ, on his second coming, will reign on the earth for a thousand years—and this in His own physical person—is reported to be steadily growing. At a recent New York conference, papers strongly supporting this doctrine were read by men high in the Presbyterian councils. The post-millennarians declare that although the highest body in the Church has never made a direct deliverance on the subject, yet it has always been taken as the standard of belief in the Church, that the second coming of Christ will be the final judgment. The question is now being discussed in clerical circles throughout the United States, and all parties agree that it will never be settled until a deliverance from the General Assembly upon it has been obtained.

Local and Other Items.

LORD BEACONSFIELD'S gout has almost passed away.

EARLY this morning the thermometer registered three (3) below zero.

THE funeral of Ralph B. Peake, Esq., was very largely attended. The "Hollo" "Hillsborough" and "John A." fire companies were present in uniform.

MR DONALD NICHOLSON of this city has obtained the agency of the Cooley Portable Creamery for this Province. The Creamery is an air tight zinc-lined box, about three by two feet capacity, called a water cooler, which generally contains two cans. These cans are twenty inches deep and eight and one-half inches in diameter; the covers are fastened down, and the air under the rims of the covers prevents the passage of any water into the cans. The cans are set in the water coolers, which are lined with metal, and fitted with inlet and overflow for using flowing spring water. These coolers are thoroughly built, with tight fitting covers, to exclude warm air, and retard the melting of ice when used to maintain a uniform temperature. A thermometer is inserted in the front of each cooler, in order that the temperature can be ascertained without raising the cover. This apparatus is very simple, dispensing with costly milk rooms, as but little room is required, and is the only system that will produce uniform results, and until some uniform is adopted there will be as many grades of butter in the market as there are makers. If the temperature of the water in the coolers is kept at 40° to 45° in spring and summer, and at 40° in winter, the cream will rise in twelve hours, in which case only cans enough to hold a single milking are required, or one-fourth of the capacity needed with any of the patent open-pan systems of setting.
