 It is submitted that meals should be confined to students themselves, for which the hall was intended, and no extension thereof be permitted in connection with the local restaurants, unless, under government direction, to a station where those meals are obviously subsidized by public funds. The same course, of course, to other functions at Montgomery Hall, such as public receptions, conventions, and the like, where that institution is opened up in competition to established hotels in the province.

Noting that increased facilities for campers are being provided in parks established out of public funds, the association felt that a "realistic and competitive charge" should be made for the use of such facilities, as, according to the brief, such facilities should "really be left for private enterprise to provide. Otherwise rates become badly out of line and you get public funds competing with the investment of private individuals in this field to the great detriment of the latter."

**ISLAND DISHES NEEDED**  
 Regarding the feeding of tourists, it was stated in a brief that the association "does not feel that we have yet reached par. We particularly recommend to the Provincial Tourist Loan Committee that every consideration be given to applicants interested in developing this important phase of the tourist industry."

"With the abundance of our world-famous sea and shell fish and our outstanding agricultural products, we have need of first class eating establishments specializing in distinctive island dishes."

"Another real need in the province is for smart restaurants at the piers at Borden and West Islands to serve the needs of our tourists waiting at those points to catch ferries."

It was recommended that the provincial government sponsor a cooking course for those engaged in the industry. It was stated in the brief that the association looks to the government to lend every effort in procuring new ferries for the Borden-Cape Tormentine service and the Wood Islands-Caribou service.

Also urged was assistance in getting a West Point ferry service established. The association pointed out that "West Prince has lagged behind the rest of the province in its developing tourist industry and the establishment of this new ferry service will do more than anything to bring this section of the province up to par from the tourist standpoint."

It was announced that the association has arranged for a pier at the Borden Pier for the approaching summer tourist season "so that all of our 1962 summer visitors will be made to feel welcome in real highland fashion."

**OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS**  
 Other recommendations for the establishment of a fisheries exhibition in St. John's, preferably in September; assistance to fishermen in outfitting boats to take tourists deep sea fishing; assistance and encouragement to attractive packaging of food-stuffs as souvenir items, and encouragement in every way of things historical throughout the province.

**EXHIBITION DATE**  
 Also efforts to have "our Provincial Exhibition at Charlottetown moved back from August, where we are at the height of our holiday season anyway, to September in order to try and lighten out our all-too-short present tourist season;" procurement of the services of an expert to study and make recommendations on the whole subject of upland game; efforts for the beautification of piers surrounding areas at Borden and Wood Islands; an educational program aimed at the alleviation of highway litter; elimination of various shale and gravel holes in close proximity to public highways.

Also provision for a new classification under the Land valuation Act to provide for tourist resorts which at the moment have no classification of their own and are faced with serious financial hardships on that account; arrangements for the payment of education for an annual Tourist Day in all public schools to bring home to youth the significance of the value of the tourist industry; a more re-
