Rev. Mr. Fream of St. Stephen's Church, Burlington is spending his holidays in Toronto.

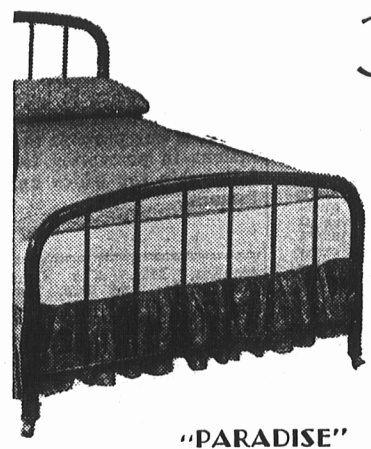

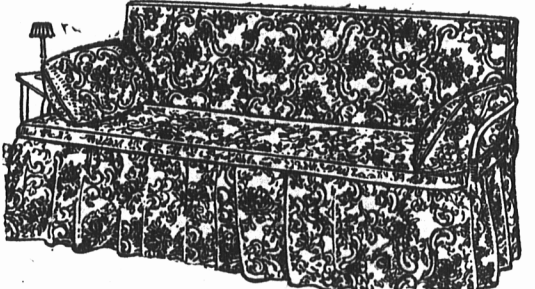

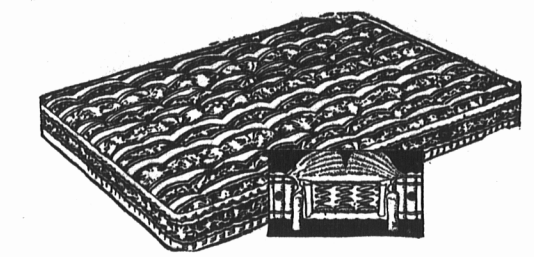
