Pilot Killed In Flaming Crash

AURORA, Colo., May 14 — (CP) — Three houses in this Denver suburb were set afire today in the flaming crash of a jet fighter plane that killed the pilot and severely burned a man working in his garden.

The four families of the first two houses in the path of the plane were away from home. Witnesses who saw the brief one-mile flight of the plane from Lowry air force base to the block of new frame houses said the pilot seemed to be in trouble from the start.
