**COUNTY COURT.**  
 The County Court of Queen's County, which opened here on Tuesday last, continued in session all the week and closed at noon today. The following are some of the suits tried:  
 George A Kays vs. William Lamont—This was an action for \$85.00 for work done by the plaintiff in the construction of a steam generation and bath boiler for a lobster factory for the defendant at Belle Greek. The suit which was commenced in March last has been before the Court each term since and a large number of witnesses were examined. The defence was that the generator was not so constructed as to answer the purpose designed and was not built on a suitable foundation. In consequence the building caught fire shortly after its construction. Judge Alley delivered a written judgment in which all the evidence was carefully reviewed, and awarded judgment for the defendant, with costs. A. Peters for plaintiff, McLean Q. C. for defendant.  
 Ambrose Colwill vs. John Buchanan—Action of damages for collision in negligence driving on the highway, \$10.00. Defence that plaintiff was liable for contributory negligence. Judgment \$7.50 and costs.  
 Philip Curley vs. Francis McKenna—Action of damages for \$25 for non-delivery of a heater sold by defendant to plaintiff for \$16 and upon which plaintiff had paid \$5 deposit. The question, at issue between the parties was the identity of the heater sold. It appeared that the defendant had two heaters of same age. One was red which was in good condition, the other white which was not so good. A number of witnesses were examined and the evidence was very contradictory and conflicting. Judgment was given for the deposit money paid (\$5.00) the costs to be equally apportioned between both parties. McLean, Q. C. for plaintiff, Attorney General for defendant.  
 Donald A. Bruce vs. Thomas Ronaghan.—Action for balance on overcoat, \$15.25. Defence debt out of date. Judgment for defendant without costs.  
 James Trainor vs. Pope Mills—Action balance due on work and material in boring well, \$5.00. Judgment for \$4.00 and costs.  
 Several other suits were tried of which we have been unable to obtain particulars.

On Wednesday the little girl was at school as usual, and about 12 o'clock her teacher allowed her to go home as she was complaining of headache. Shortly after returning home she appeared about as usual and no particular attention was paid by her parents to her illness. On the following morning, however, she became suddenly very sick. Dr. Kelly saw her in the afternoon and found her in a critical condition, suffering from an acute eruptive disease which was afterwards complicated with pneumonia. He immediately notified Dr. H. D. Johnson, the acting health officer, who saw the case shortly afterwards, and everything possible has been done to prevent the spread of the disease. The little girl was buried this morning at 10 o'clock.
