Campaign of Prejudice

Reference was made to the campaign of prejudice carried on by the Liberal press and politicians in the last election contest. The speaker had warned the electors that the Liberal policy would be to work down on necessary public works expenditures, and this in turn would deprive the deserving men of many thousands of dollars and would create a condition of great hardship. "Was not that a true forecast?" he continued. "How many men have worked on the roads this summer? How many poor men have earned a dollar in this manner on Liberal road-work? What was the order that the road superintendent issued? To do nothing; and that is evident from the condition of the roads today. There may be some roads in Kings County that have been attended to, but so far as the average roads are concerned, they have been in a disgraceful condition." (Applause.)

The speaker recalled the Liberal campaign against the trans-Canada highway and the route followed, which he maintained was in the best interests of the Province. "I have no regrets about the highway," he declared. "When the Liberals lay down fifty miles of paved highway in this Province, it will be time enough for them to criticize what we have done." The trans-Canada highway was obtained by co-operation between the Conservative representatives, federal and provincial. Dr. MacMillan emphasized. In this connection he repeated the tribute he had paid to Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett on the occasion of his visit here last year, as being "Prince Edward Island's best friend" during the years of world depression. "Time will prove that to be correct," he added. "Time will place Mr. Bennett in his proper niche. It will justify his conduct of the government of Canada during the most trying period of its history, when he brought us through with all our resources intact, and in better condition financially than any other country in the world." (Applause.)

National Park

Dr. MacMillan next referred to the National Park question. Many different sites have been mentioned—at Bonshaw, Rocky Point, Victoria Park, Foxley River, Rustico, Acadia, Dalway, Bedouque, etc. He called attention to the fact that in the House of Commons it was stated that New Brunswick could not receive an appropriation this year because they had not agreed upon a site. This would indicate that a different condition prevailed in this province and Nova Scotia. "The remarkable thing is that this government has recommended a certain site to the federal authorities. Now they say that no site will be chosen until the question is submitted to the thirty wise men who compose the Legislature. That is putting the cart before the horse. You would think that when the government passed an order-in-council and made a recommendation, it was a poor time to consult the rank and file of the Legislature. Why bring those engineers here from Ottawa, and try to put the responsibility on them? Why not be fair with the public and tell them the whole story? Because there is an interesting story and it may be more interesting before its culmination." Dr. MacMillan recalled the frequent campaign statements of the late Peter Sinclair, M.P. about the "iniquitous" Bennett government sales tax. Mr. Sinclair's method was to tell the farmers that when they went to town with a dollar, they "only thought they had a dollar; six cents are what Bennett takes out of your pocket in sales tax."

Who, Indeed?

Referring again to personal attacks made on him in the Patriot newspaper, Dr. MacMillan asked, amid applause, who had more reason to be "disgruntled" than the Patriot editor himself, who had been unable to obtain a dozen votes in support of his nomination as Liberal candidate in his old home constituency in the last election campaign.

The Patriot had also referred approvingly to the speech delivered by Prof. Cyrus Macmillan at the Mount Stewart war memorial service. It was indeed a speech worthy of one who had attained the position of head of the department of English literature at McGill University. Prof. Macmillan had also made reference to the need of giving returned soldiers "a square deal," and it would have been more to the point if the Patriot had drawn this significant reference to the attention of its party government, whose dismissal of returned men for political reasons has been notorious.

Political Dismissals

Continuing, Dr. MacMillan referred among other dismissals, to the case of Mr. George Grant, efficient manager of the School Supply department at Charlottetown. He expected the same extravagance in this department of the former Liberal government, which was largely responsible for accumulating an overdraft of \$36,000. No books or records were available to Mr. Grant to collect these outstanding bills, but through good business methods he had succeeded in salvaging over \$10,000 out of the wreck. He has been dismissed by the present government, and his place filled by a fox rancher.

Another Neglected Promise

The Liberal platform contained the pledge to obtain from the federal government 100 per cent payment of old age pensions. This, Dr. MacMillan showed, was an unfulfilled promise without performance. "How they made any attempt to implement their platform in this respect? None that I have heard of."

"Must Not Be Bothered"

"You will find that the present Premier is not much concerned about the people who elect him. He has evidently only one ambition; he wants to mark time until he sees a vacancy on the Supreme Court bench. He does not intend to face the electors again if he can help it, and consequently he is too big to deal with the people who come into his office. I take his own words for that. He cannot be 'bothered' with them! He might be off on a holiday, or he might be playing tennis, or doing something else of much more importance, from Mr. Campbell's viewpoint. The humblest subject of the British Empire can get his representations before the King, but you cannot get your representations to Mr. Campbell because he will not see you!" (Applause.)
