Go't Changes Monday

OTTAWA (CP)—The Progressive Conservative government entered its final days Wednesday with Prime Minister Diefenbaker tendering his resignation and Liberal Leader Pearson accepting Governor-General Vanier's invitation to form a government and become Canada's 14th prime minister.

Power actually will change hands about noon Monday, Mr. Diefenbaker remaining in office until then. He is scheduled to meet his cabinet this morning.

Separate visits to the bedside of Gen. Vanier, who is recovering from a heart attack, were made by the two leaders. Mr. Diefenbaker submitted his resignation effective at noon Monday. Mr. Pearson told Gen. Vanier he was prepared to take office then.

Skies were overcast and temperatures in the mid-40s as the two men went through the constitutional steps that will mean switching jobs.

After his visit to Gen. Vanier, Mr. Diefenbaker said he expects Parliament will be available when the House opens at 10 a.m. on Monday. He said the government has set itself the goal of returning to power. He told reporters:

"I intend to carry on. I'll be available when the House opens at 10 a.m. on Monday. I will meet him again on Monday morning next. The new government will at that time be sworn in."

MEET AGAIN MONDAY

Standing on the same spot in a government House ante-room a few hours later, Mr. Pearson said:

"His excellency invited me to form a government. I accepted the invitation and I am to meet him again on Monday morning next. The new government will at that time be sworn in."

Then to rapid-fire questions from reporters, he repeated that he expects Parliament will be opened Thursday, May 16, and that he is working out early meetings with Prime Minister Macmillan of Britain and President Kennedy of the United States.

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ELECTION ACT AMENDMENTS PASS

Amendments to the new Election Act yesterday eliminated the Fifth District; the Sixth District; and the Kings County and Queens County divisions.

At the same time, Speaker of the House, Hon. John R. MacLean, PC 1st Kings, occupying a private member's seat while the bill was in committee did not rise for the standing vote.

Members M.L. Bonnell and A.W. Matheson immediately claimed he could not abstain in Queens.

The first amendment, moved the previous day by Provincial Treasurer M. Alban Farmer, increased Charlottetown's representation in the Legislature to five from four.

The second amendment, moved by the Sixth District's Queens, was adopted on a 13-10 vote. Eight Liberals voted against it. They were joined by Walter Dingwall, PC 2nd Kings.

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Matheson Mixes In Duel Of Words

Events in the Legislature took a surprising turn last night when Opposition Leader A.W. Matheson rose to speak in the budget debate.

Starting out slowly, Mr. Matheson soon was engaged in a fiery duel of words with several cabinet ministers, including Premier Walter R. Shaw.

It had been taken for granted that Mr. Matheson would not participate in the budget debate and Premier Shaw was expected to close the debate last night. However, as the premier finished, Robert Campbell (L-1st Prince) spoke amid objections by government members but that tradition the premier closes the debate.

After Mr. Campbell's speech, Mr. Matheson took the floor.

FORCED TO SPEAK

"I had not intended to take part in this debate," said Mr. Matheson, "but I find that the leader of the government has made some untrue statements and I must refer to them."
