Education and Agriculture.

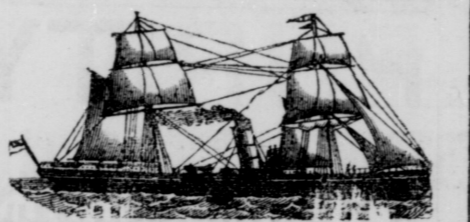

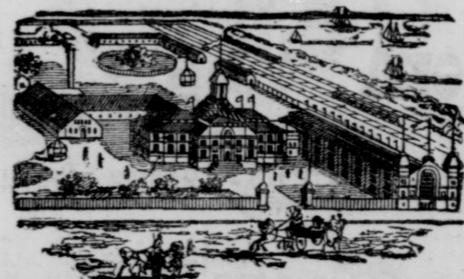
