

# IN MEMORIAM

## STERLING VINCENT BUCHANAN

The people of Eidon and surrounding districts were deeply shocked at the sudden passing of 1/5 Sterling Vincent Buchanan in his 21st year, due to a car accident at Pugwash, N. S., on October 29. He was born at Montague the son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren D. Buchanan and moved to Eidon at the early age of six weeks. Vincent attended Eidon school and at the age of sixteen went to Toronto and one year later joined the R. C. N. in which he served three years. He had a promising future in the navy where he took up torpedo detection, and a course as Prospector.

He will be sadly missed by his large circle of friends both young and old, and especially in his home by his sorrowing parents, brothers and sisters. Vincent was an honest, bright boy, kind and pleasant of nature, loving and generous to his family. Whenever possible he came home for week-end leaves, and had been home two weeks before his tragic death, when God called him to His Heavenly Home. He leaves to mourn his passing his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Warren Buchanan, four brothers: Windsor, Toronto; Victor, at Lunenburg; Ronald, at Halifax, and Blair at home; four sisters, Mrs. Colin Macdonald (Nelsina) of Montague; Mrs. Murray Heffler (Jeanette) of Seckville, N.B.; Gloria and Dianne at home. An infant brother predeceased him twenty-seven years ago.

"We cannot say, and we will not say that he is dead — he is just away. With a cheery smile, and a wave of the hand he has wandered into an unknown land. We think of him still as the same, we say 'he is not dead — he is just away.'"

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon for the late Sterling Vincent Buchanan with full honours being accorded. A short service was held at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Warren Buchanan of Eidon followed by service at St. John's Presbyterian Church, Belfast.

Services were conducted by Rev. John M. Sheen, Rev. J. E. Heathwood, and Rev. A. C. Fraser. Hymns sung were "Unto the Hills", "Safe in the Arms of Jesus", and a solo by Lloyd Martin "The Love of God".

The honorary pallbearers were: Chief Petty Officers Llewellyn MacMillan, Anderson, and Petty Officer White. Active pallbearers were Messrs. Wilbur Adams, Richard Knox, Robert Knox, Alvin MacPherson, Glen MacLeod, John Ross. At the grave the last post was sounded by William Chaisson, and the regulation volleys were fired. Shut out from the world and its troubles for the good Lord himself knows how long lives a race of light-skinned natives in a land that flows with milk and honey, a valley rich in vegetation, blue lakes, and what not, a land that has never felt the white man's footsteps. Think of it!

To prove to the men who flew over it took many pictures. A spokesman for the survey company says that patrols already being organized to journey behind the 12,000-foot mountain peaks to explore the beautiful spot.

When she was led to her patient's room her heart skipped a beat for there, to her astonishment, lay an elderly man with a gunshot wound in his chest. Dr. Spillman who was already working over the victim looked up and said, "Nurse, this man was shot last night. The bullet went in here and is near the surface at the scapula in the back. We'll remove it at once."

The wounded man was a police officer from Cambridge named John Ingerman. He had been shot by a robber in an attempted holdup during the night. He died that same day. Strange But True! Egypt Ratifies Suez Agreement

CAIRO Reuters — Egypt has ratified the Suez agreement providing for withdrawal of 80,000 British troops from the strategic canal zone, Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzy announced today.

He said the cabinet has ratified the agreement "in the name of the nation," and it has been signed by the prime minister, Lt. Col. Gamal Abdel Nasser, acting as chief of state.

Former president Mohammed Naguib was known to be opposed to certain aspects of the Anglo-Egyptian agreement and there was speculation in Cairo until he was deposed last Sunday whether his signature was necessary for ratification.

It became known two days ago that Nasser had given top priority to ratification of the agreement after taking over Naguib's functions as chief of state.

Fawzy said the two countries will exchange the instruments of ratification Dec. 1, six days ahead of the Dec. 7 deadline set when the pact was signed last month.

The agreement covers the withdrawal of British troops from the Suez canal zone within 20 months. Civilian technicians will maintain the base and British troops can return in the event of any attack on certain Middle East countries, including Turkey.

# Beatification of French Missionary

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The venerable Jean Martin Moyer, an 18th century French missionary who founded the Congregation of the Sisters of Providence, was beatified Sunday.

The bells of all Rome's 500 churches pealed during the ceremony at St. Peter's Basilica.

Before a gathering which included five cardinals and several hundred members of the Sisters of Providence, Msgr. Leon Gromier, administrator of the Vatican prelates, read the papal decree bestowing on the venerable Moyer the second highest honor of the Roman Catholic Church. The highest honor is canonization as a saint.

Sunday night the Pope, in a ceremony illuminated by more than 10,000 lights, led in the veneration of the missionary.

The Pontiff appeared somewhat worn and tired, but responded smilingly to the cheers of thousands as he was borne in his portable throne through the Basilica, around the main altar and then before the cathedral altar at the end of the church. He stepped down firmly for his part in the half hour ritual.

# May Try McCarthy On Single Count

WASHINGTON (AP)—A move to replace two censure charges against Senator Joseph McCarthy with a single count accusing him of maligning the censure committee was reported gaining headway among senators Sunday.

Such a proposal has been discussed as a possible joint Republican-Democratic action by senators who have not committed themselves so far on the two original charges against the Republican senator from Wisconsin.

These two charges, contained in a resolution offered by the special committee headed by Senator Arthur Watkins (Rep.-Utah), are: 1. That McCarthy treated an elections sub-committee in 1951-52 with contempt by refusing to appear before it to answer questions about his finances.

2. That he abused Brig.-Gen. Ralph Zwicker, a witness before his investigations sub-committee earlier this year.

## THIRD COUNT

Senator Wallace Bennett (Rep.-Utah), has said he will propose a third censure count, based on McCarthy's recent action in accusing Senator Watkins of cowardly action and saying the Watkins committee had served as the "unwitting handmaiden" of the Communist party in recommending censure.

A Democratic senator who asked to remain anonymous said he believes a majority of the Senate thinks McCarthy should be censured for the statements.

This Democrat said his surveys indicate the Zwicker count has lost support steadily since Senator Dennis Case (Rep.-S. D.), a member of the Watkins committee, announced he would not back that portion of the censure resolution.

The Democratic senator said he and colleagues who have discussed the matter feel the charge that McCarthy showed contempt for the 1951-52 committee investigating his finances had substantial merit but, after all, was somewhat "old stuff."

He said, however, there could be little argument over McCarthy's more recent attacks on the Watkins committee.

The Senate is in recess until Nov. 29 as a result of McCarthy's confinement to hospital with an injured elbow.
