Deputy Minister Of Education Is Guest Speaker

A large number of interested citizens attended an open meeting of the Home and School Association which was held in the A.D. MacKenzie Hall, Montague, last evening when the guest speaker was Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education. He was introduced by the president of the association, Dr. G. S. Inman.

Dr. Shaw in his opening remarks commended the work of the Home and School Association and the interest which they have shown in the fostering of better relations between the parent, teacher and child. He went on to emphasize the fact that facilities had a great deal of influence on the development of the child. The school, equipment and above all the teacher surrounded the pupil with an environment which lasted many years of his life, and did much to mould the character of the future citizen.

The presence of modern schools, larger, well lighted, well ventilated, good equipment with which to work, and a teacher who knows methods, and possesses a personality which is cooperative with the student, are doing the great work of developing the future citizen.

He, however, stressed the fact that the first impressions on the child are given in the home, and the parents must be fully aware of their great responsibility, so that the young boy or girl who comes to school at the age of six has been instilled with the proper ideas of good behaviour and cooperative association with his or her playmates. With this as a basis, the teacher's work is now to develop the student physically, mentally, spiritually, and socially.

Dr. Shaw went on to describe the famous folk schools in Denmark which he had visited on his trip to that country. He explained that in these schools the students were taught an objective view towards life, with emphasis placed on the physical, mental, spiritual, and social development, a concept which has brought great changes in the young boys of Denmark, which has helped to make it the great country it is today.

He stated that the attendance of the school children of P.E.I. has risen to over 82 percent, and with such a large attendance present now is the time to instill in these students the principles of citizenship, a factor which could be greatly assisted by the Home and School Association, which had the facilities of bringing together the parents and teachers to solve mutual problems affecting the child, so that he would grow into a helpful citizen of the future.

The next speaker was Mr. S. S. Hessian, K. C., a school trustee, who outlined the present conditions in the Montague School, and stressed the need of a new school to give more space for future development and the possible inclusion of more grades. He stated that at present there are three rooms in operation in the basement of the school, a condition which does not deserve the highest compliments, as such conditions must affect the mental outlook and retard the proper development of the child. It is necessary to rectify these conditions as rapidly as possible. Mr. Hessian felt that a new school would be the answer to the problem, and the acquisition of the necessary monies should present no insurmountable difficulty.

At the conclusion of his remarks, Mr. Hessian moved a hearty vote of appreciation to Dr. Shaw, which was seconded by Mr. Charles Fraser.

Dr. A. D. MacKenzie also spoke briefly regarding the subject of home and school influence on the citizens of tomorrow. That the present number of years training for teachers was not sufficient and advocated another year at P.W. College. This principle was endorsed by Dr. Shaw, who felt that this had been a requirement for some years.

At the close of the meeting a delicious lunch was served by the ladies of the Home and School Association, and a half hour was spent in social conversation.

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Find Earth Fused When Wires Fall

The result of an unusual phenomenon may be seen at the office of R. K. Clements in Montague. It resembles a glazed stone, but actually is clay and sand, the quartz of which has been fused by a high electric current to form glass.

Two weeks ago this locality was visited by a rain storm which froze on the lines, until there were tons of weight of ice on the lines. Before the end of the day lines throughout the whole district were falling, so that Montague was soon without electric and telephone communications.

Georgetown Council Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Mayor and Town Councilors of the Town of Georgetown was held on Monday, March 12th, with His Worship Mayor P. L. Boardman presiding, with a full board of Councilors in attendance. The assessment list handed in by the assessors was presented for the approval of the Mayor and Councilors, the names of ratepayers being read to the meeting.

All adjustments made by the assessors to the value of property noted, changes of ownership and new names appearing on the list approved. All present at the meeting were unanimous in their opinion that the values as shown on the list were fair and reasonable and the assessors' report was adopted without amendments. The rate on real estate for the years 1951-1952 to remain as last year, 3-4 of 1%, or 75c on \$100.00 value. Poll tax payable by property holders, \$2.50 per annum, and for non-property holders, \$3.00 per annum. Fire tax payable on real estate to be \$1.50 yearly by each individual ratepayer. Car tax, \$2.00; dog tax, males, \$3.00 and females \$6.00; bicycle tax, 75c on each bicycle owner yearly.

Mr. F. J. Johnson was appointed Fire Chief. Mr. Clarence David was appointed as fire engine engineer. The following were named as voluntary firemen, under the direction of the Fire Chief: Joseph Dalton, George MacCormack, Marcellus Gotell, James Publicover, Harry Yorton, James MacConnell, Jr., Gordon Ross, Gerald Solomon, F. J. DeLory, and Howard Fouchere.

As there was no further business the meeting was adjourned.
