

15 Men, Tons Of Bombs And Guns Seized By Police In N.Y. Raid

NEW YORK (AP) — Police seized 15 men and tons of bombs, guns, rockets and bullets Sunday in pre-dawn raids

that smashed a Minutemen terrorist plot, District Attorney Nat H. Hentel of Queens announced.

Hentel said the terrorist plot involved sending squads of heavily armed men disguised as hunters, to blow up three privately operated camps in New York State, Connecticut and New Jersey. The plan was to have been carried out Sunday, a few days after the opening of the hunting season, Hentel said.

He would not reveal the identity of the target camps. But he said the Minutemen organization is an extreme right-wing group dedicated to destroying "Communist, left-wing and liberal" installations.

Robert Bolivar Depugh, national leader of the Minutemen, was mentioned by Hentel. He could not be reached for comment. A phone call to Depugh's home at Norborne, Mo., brought the response that he was away until next week.

MANY POLICE INVOLVED
Hentel said the raids, by 110 state, county and city officers, were staged simultaneously in New York City, on Long Island and in upstate New York. He said they brought in this area's

Pressure Mounting On Erhard

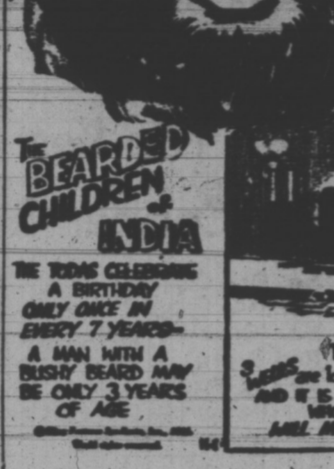
BONN (AP) — Pressure for Chancellor Ludwig Erhard's resignation is rising in West Germany.

Mayor Willie Brandt of West Berlin, head of the opposition Socialist party said that his group would be ready to join a coalition government. Leading socialists had hitherto avoided any clear statement on this point.

Erhard has strongly opposed a so-called "grand coalition" with the socialists. Other Christian Democratic leaders have been less positive.

Halifax Doctor Dies At Age 64
HALIFAX (CP)—Dr. Roberts Bond Nichols, 64, well-known Halifax physician and educationist, died in the Victoria General Hospital Saturday.

Dr. Nichols, a 1925 graduate of Dalhousie University medical school, was chief anaesthetist at the Halifax Children's Hospital at the time of her death. She was also professor of anaesthesiology and anatomy at Dalhousie.

Active in community and professional organizations, she was a past president of the Canadian Women's Medical Association and was recently appointed serving officer with the St. John Ambulance Corps.

She is survived by four children. Dr. E. G. Nichols, head of the physiology and sociology departments at Mount Allison University in Sackville, N.B.; John R. Nichols, a Digby, N.S. lawyer; Robert H. Nichols, a teacher in neighboring Dartmouth; and Mrs. Margaret Bishop of Singapore, Malaysia. Dr. Nichols' husband, Dr. W. W. Nichols, former head of Dal-

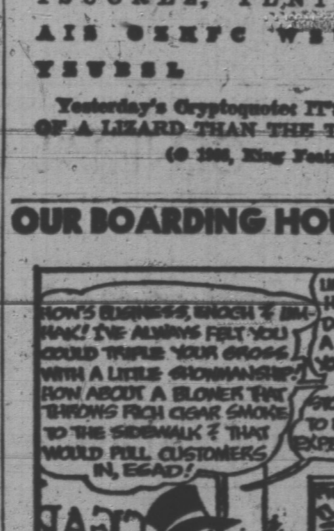
