

**Mayor Whitton
Says She'll Not
Seek Re-election**

OTTAWA (CP)—Charlotte Whitton Wednesday said she will not stand for re-election as mayor of Ottawa, adding her decision "is in no way related to any question of entering any political contest at any other level of government."

She made the announcement in a newspaper advertisement and said she will not seek nomination as a Progressive Conservative in the next federal election, expected next June.

Her announcement was not unexpected. Reports Oct. 19 said she had told her special political committee that she planned to retire from civic politics.

The report was followed by speculation that she might run for Parliament as a Progressive Conservative in Ottawa West or Renfrew South. There also were frequent reports in recent years that she would enter Premier Frost's cabinet and run for the Ontario legislature.

Mayor Whitton, 60, was a member of board of control when mayor Grenville Goodwin died in September, 1951. She was elected by the board to complete his term and was returned to office in 1952 and again in 1954. She has been mayor longer than any other to hold that office except Stanley Lewis.

A dauntless and determined fighter, her terms at city hall have been marked by frequent battles with the all-male board of control and often with city council.

**Italian Marshal
Badoglio Dies**

GRAZZANO BADOGLIO, Italy (AP)—Marshal Pietro Badoglio who conquered Ethiopia for Mussolini and eventually signed Italy's unconditional surrender in the Second World War, died early today in obscure retirement. He was 85.

The old soldier who rode in triumph into Addis Ababa in 1936 and who was chosen by the late king Vittorio Emanuele III to replace the dictator Mussolini in 1943 had long been retired from public life.

In failing health for months, he left his home in Rome last August to return to his native village—Grazzano Badoglio. It had been named Grazzano d'Asi but was renamed in his honor.

**Dean Of Medicine
At McGill Dies**

MONTREAL (CP)—Dr. G. Lyman Duff, 52, dean of the faculty of medicine at McGill University for six years and widely known as a pathologist and for his research work in heart disease, died early Thursday. He had long been ill.

Dr. Duff came to McGill from the University of Toronto in 1939. He made outstanding contributions to medicine through investigation of diseases of the heart and the circulatory system. One of his special fields was research into causes of hardening of the arteries.

He was born in Hamilton in 1904. He was a graduate of the University of Toronto, where he began his teaching career in 1929. In 1932 he was appointed to the staff of Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Md., as a fellow in medicine under the National Research Council. He also became assistant pathologist at Johns Hopkins Hospital.

RECEIVED MANY HONORS

He returned to University of Toronto in 1935 where he became lecturer in pathology and assistant pathologist at Toronto General Hospital. After he became associated with McGill positions of increasing importance and high honors came to him.

Dr. Duff was long interested in medical museums. He was appointed curator of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps Museum in 1941. In 1951 at Cleveland he was elected president of the International Association of Museums.

In the same year he became the first Canadian president of the American Society for the Study of Arteriosclerosis. In 1954 he was elected president of the American Association of Pathologists and Bacteriologists. He also served as president of the National Cancer Institute of Canada.

He was a member of the Pathological Society of Great Britain and Ireland as well as Montreal and provincial medical groups. He was consultant pathologist at several Montreal hospitals.

Dr. Duff is survived by his widow, formerly Isobel F. Griffiths; two sons, Graham and Ian, and two daughters, Sheila and Catherine.
